Petersbourg, June 23.
ETTERS from Felt Marshal Munich of the 8th Instant advise, that he was then arrived on the Banks of the River Bog; that a Body of Tartars appearing on the other Side; Count Munich fent a Detachment to chase them, which had no fooner passed the River than the Tartars retired. Two Days ago a Courier arrived here with Letters from Felt Marshal Lacy dated the 11th Instant, by which this Court is informed, that he was not above 40 or 50 Wersts from the Perecop, and that the Florilla was near him. having coasted from Asoph the North Shore of the Palus Meotis, and anchored every Night within Sight of his Camp; that as yet they have feen no Turkish Ships or Vessels in those Seas; and it is thought Felt Marshal Lacy will transport Part of his Army in his Boats over the Gnil Moor into the Crimea. This Morning there happened a difinal Fire in the finest Part of this City, but the Number of Houses and Palaces that are confumed is not yet known; among the latter are those of Princess Elizabeth, Prince Chercasky, Prince Cantemir, Felt Marshal Trubetskoy, Prince Schackoskoy, Count Sava, Count Aprakin, Count Poofiken, General Ushakof, Countes Jagozinskoy, the Houses, in which the Swedish Envoy and Dutch Rediden lived; and that of the Prussian Minister is very much damaged.

Vienna, July 10, N.S. Letters are just arrived in Town from M. Seckendorff, in which he advices, that he was arrived at Colar, a Place about four Days March from Semendria towards Jagodin, with the Infantry under his Command; and that Marshal Philippi conducts the Cavalry through the Mountainous Road towards Jagodin It is supposed they are by this Time upon the Turkish Territories: Prince Hildburgshausen ad-vances likewise towards Bosnia, but in such a Manner as to be as near to the Great Army as possible. These Advices add, that Nissa will be invested about the 20th Instant at farthest. Count Wallis will, as is supposed, enter into Walachia with the greatest Part of the Body he Commands at the same Time, and People flatter themselves that he, at least, will find very little Opposition. If the Siege of Nissa is finished soon enough to allow the Undertaking that of Viddin this Campaign, the three Corps will join together for that Purpose, All the Dispositions of the Turks are said to be very weak. There will be a folemn Procession next Sunday to the Cathedral Church, at which the Emperour and the whole Court will affift to ask God Almighty's Bleffing and Affiftance, which is the usual Way of be-ginning War against the Turks, and a Manifesto will be distributed the Day before: It is already printed in Latin and German, and is now printing in French and Italian.

Hague, July 26, N. S. The Imperial and French Ministers delivered Yesterday to the States General, the Answer of their Masters to their High Mightinesses Re. folution touching the Succession of Bergues and Juliers; and to Day they communicated to them the Treaty of Pacification concluded at Vienna, and desired their Accession to it. The Emperor's Manifesto, giving his Reasons for entring into the Waragainst the Turks, has likewise been communicated to their High Mightinesses by Count d'Uhlefeld. We have confirmed Advice from Florence, that the Great Duke of Tuscany, named John Gaston de Medicis, the last of his Family, died there on the 9th Instant, in the 67th Year of his Age.
