Petersbourg, July 9. A Courier is arri-ved here from Felt Marshal Count Munich, with Advice, that he had paffed the River Bog the 16th, 17th, and 18th of June, about a Hundred and Twenty Five Verits from Bender, and One Hundred from Oczakow, with all his Army and Artillery, on four Bridges made of Pontons, and had found no Body to oppose him on the other Side, when Ten thousand Men might have hindered a Hundred thousand croffing the River, which is about a Hundred Paces broad, very rapid, the Banks craggy, and about thirty Foot high. Count Munich fays that Oczakow is farther from the Bog than marked in the Map; he was marching to-wards that Place the 18th of June, when the Courier fet out, who also informs us, that the Eight Thousand Men which are commanded by Colonel Keyferling, had joined the main Army. Count Munich has acquain-ted the Czarina, that he heard the Turks had at Bender about Fifteen Thousand Men, and at other Places on the Niefter Twenty Thousand more, which is not a sufficient Number to prevent his taking Oczakow. Α Courier arrived here fome Days ago from Samara ; he was fent by Major General Trubetskoy, to inform her Czarish Majesty, that the greatest Part of the Boats that are carrying Provisions to Felt Marshal Munich's Army, had happily passed the Cataracts or Falls that are in the River Nieper. It is thought Count Oftein and the Ruffian Plenipotentiaries are fet out from Kioff before now, in order to go to Niemeroff, where it is faid M. Tahlman and the Turkish Ministers will soon arrive. We have had again the Misfortune on the 6th Instant, of another great Fire in this City, which in less than ten Hours confumed above Five hundred Houles; among which is that of Major General Ifmayloff, and that of the Prince of Heffe Hombourg is very much damaged. It is true, that all the Houses that were burnt in this last Fire were built of Wood. No body can conceive the Fright People are in here for Fear of being burnt, and the great Milery vait Numbers of poor People are reduced to by the late Fires. Though feveral Perfons have been taken up on Sulpicion of being Incendiaries, as yet none have been convicted thereof.
