Vienna, August 21.

Yesterday arrived an Express from Field Marshal Count Seckendorff, with an Account, that General Count Kvenhuller, with the Body of Forces he commands, came before Widdin on the 8th Instant, and invested it in such a Manner, that no Succours can be conveyed into it. Count Seckendorff continued with the Imperial Army at Nissa the 15th Instant; waiting till that Place should be well provided with every thing necessary for its Defence; which done, it was not doubted he would move towards Widdin. It is rumoured, that there has been another Action between the Troops commanded by the Prince of Hildbourghaufen and the Turks, and that the latter were repulsed with considerable Loss: Of which we wait the Confirmation.

And the Court of Assistants for managing the said Charity do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at the Admiralty Office on Tuesday the 13th of September next, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows, as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
