Moft Gracious Sovereign, WE your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars of the University of Oxford, with all Humility beg Leave to offer to your Majesty our most fincere Congratulations upon the Increase of your Royal Family by the Birth of a Princels.

The many Bleffings deriv'd upon this Nation by your Majefty and your illustrious Houle, must engage all your Subjects to think themselves nearly interested in every Event that brings Joy to your Majesty, and with Hearts full of Gratitude to adore that Providence which opens to them the pleafing Profpect of the Continuance of their National Happinels, by adding to the Number of your Royal Offspring.

We are deeply fensible of the many Bleffings we enjoy in common with all your Majefty's Subjects under your auspicious Government; we want Words to express the grateful Sentiments we feel, while viewing these ancient Sears of Learning in a fafe and flourifhing Eftate under the kind Influence of your Majefty's Favour and Protection, we have this further Satisfaction, that we can promife ourfelves the Perpetuity of these Bleffings in your Royal Family.

We therefore most gladly embrace this Opportunity of repeating our Affurances to

your Majesty, of our inviolable Fidelity to your Royal Person and Family; and as a prevailing Senfe of Religion among your Majefty's Subjects will ever be found the beft Support of your Government, it shall be our constant Endeavour to form the Minds of that Part of the rising Generation which is committed to our Care, into a dutifulSubmiffion to your facred Authority, upon the lafting Principle of Piety to that all Powerful Being, by whofe good Providence your

Majefty is happily fet over us. May your Majefty long reign in the Hearts of a willing and obedient People; and may your Subjects all confpire to render your Government as eafy and happy to your Majefty as it is beneficial to thele Kingdoms.

Dated in the Convocation Houfe under the Seal of the University, the Twenty fourth Day of August, in the Year of our Lord, 1737.
