This was no sooner known to Felt Marshal Munich, (who had then with him an Officer from the Garrifon, who had demanded a Sufpenfion of Arms for 24 Hours, which was refused) than he fent 6000 Regular Troops to affift the Collacks and Huffars, who got alfo into the Town, and cut to pieces all that oppofed them : Whilft this Confusion lasted, those Troops which had made a Feint to attack the Walls, actually fealed the fame and got in, but not without great Lofs, there being about 1000 Men killed, among whom are one Colonel, two Lieutenant Colonels, two Majors, and 150 other Officers ; and about 3000 wounded; of which Number are Lieutenant General Keith, Lieutenant General Baron Lowendahl, and Majors General Araktsheoff, Krushoff, and Backmotoff, befides several other Officers of less Diffinction. Felt Marshal Munich had a Horfe killed under him, as had alfo the Prince of Brunfwick, who accompanied him every where and had a Page killed by his Side. The Turks on their Side, had near 17000 military Men, and about the fame Number of Inhabitants killed, no Quarter being given at the Time the Town was taken, which was on the 2d of July, O.S. There are about 3500 Turkish Prisoners, which are all that remain of the Garrilon that were not killed or drowned; among the Captives is the Seraskier, named Jiagia; who is a Bafhaw of three Horle Tails, and was Master of the Horse to the late Sultan, and Son in Law to the late Grand Vizier Ali. The Bashaw of Oczakow is also taken Prisoner: Five other Bashaws of two Horse Tails were killed. The Booty taken on this Occasion is very confiderable, and would have been much more fo, if feveral valuable Things had not been confumed by the Fire. In the Place were found 82 Brals, and four Iron Cannon, feven Mortars, eleven Horfe Tails, and a very great Quantity of Small Arms. Berlin, Sept. 3, N. S.
