*Petersbourg, August 13.*

**T**HE last Letters from the Congress at Niemeroff were dated the 26th of July, at which Time the Plenipotentiaries had already made a Regulation as usual concerning their Servants Behaviour, but they had not yet begun their Conferences in Form. The last Accounts this Court has received from Felt Marshal Munich, are dated the 22d of July; at the Departure of the Courier, Count Munich was with his Army about 60 Versts from Oczakow, on the Banks of the River Bog, not being able to proceed yet towards Bender, because the Tartars had destroyed all the Forage between the Niefter and the Bog. This Morning the great Guns of the Citadel and Admiralty were fired on Account of the great Advantages her Czarish Majesty's Troops have had this Campaign over the Tartars of Crimea. On the 11th Instant a Courier arrived from Felt Marshal Lacy, giving an Account that the Army under his Command had repassed the Gniloe More, in order to return into their former Quarters, not being able to subsist any longer in the Crimea, which they had entirely laid waste wherever they passed. Last Monday a Woman was beheaded, and two Men burnt alive here, being convicted of having set a House on Fire which occasioned the great Conflagration we had last in this Town.

*Petersbourg, Aug. 16.* It is advised from Peterhoff, where the Czarina has her Court, that Felt Marshal Lacy had actually repassed the Gniloe More with his Army, after having entirely destroyed the greatest Part of the open Country of the Crimea. They add, that three Turkish Men of War, and fourteen Gallies, had prevented the Russian Flotilla from ravaging the Sea Coast of Kertch and Kassa; and that the Flotilla had suffered very much by a Storm. Last Saturday Night a Courier arrived at Peterhoff with Letters from Niemeroff, dated the 2d Instant, by which the Czarina is informed, that there had been great Disturbances at Constantinople, to appease which, several great Men had been put to Death, and others banished; that the Grand Vizier is deposed and sent to the Island of Negropont, but his Estates were not taken from him; his Kiahaja was strangled, as was also the Kissler Aga, the Grand Signior's chief Favourite. The Seraskier of Bender is made Grand Vizier; he is a Son of a late Grand Vizier who was killed in the last Persian War, and a very enterprising Man.

*Vienna, Aug. 31, N. S.* A Major arrived two Days ago from Marshal Seckendorff, who was still with Part of his Army near Nissa. It is reported now that the Siege of Widdin will be laid aside for this Year, instead of which it is said the Marshal is to turn at once and come into Bosnia, to make the Siege of Zwornick jointly with Prince Hildburghausen. The Turks have found Means already to throw a Succour of 4000 Men into the Town of Widdin, though it is in a manner blocked up by the Generals Kevenhuller and Wallis. We have confirmed Advice of the deposing of the Grand Vizier. The Name of his Successor is Mullan Ogli, who was formerly Bashaw of Bosnia, and is said to be a great Warrior, a good Friend of Bonnevall's, whom he has already made a Bashaw of Three Tails, and it is assured they are both already at the Army.

*Vienna, Sept. 4, N. S.* Letters from the Imperial Army relate, that Count Seckendorff had ordered Count Marully, who commands at Belgrade, to provide 4000 Rations of Bread, 20000 Rations of Oats, for 14 Days together, and 3000 Waggons at Zabatz upon the River Save; it is said that Count Kevenhuller and Count Wallis will keep Widdin blockaded, and that General Seckendorff and Prince Hildburghausen will make the Siege of Zwornick in Bosnia, and endeavour to subdue that Province entirely, in order to procure Winter Quarters there for the greatest Part of the Army.

## A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

For regulating the Value of the Gold Coins current in this Kingdom.

**W**HEREAS his Majesty has been pleased to signify his Royal Pleasure, that a Proclamation should Issue for regulating the Gold Coins current in this Kingdom, and for that Purpose his Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date at his Court at Hampton-Court, the Twenty first Day of July, One thousand seven hundred and thirty seven, has been transmitted to us, setting forth, that, Whereas the Lord Lieutenant and Council of this Kingdom, have represented to his Majesty, that there is at present a great Scarcity of Silver Coin in this Kingdom, occasioned by Persons being tempted to carry it out of this Kingdom

dom to make an Advantage thereof; and that the greatest Part of the Gold Coin current here, is in the Two larger Pieces of Portugal Gold, one of which passing for four Pounds, and the other for forty Shillings, great Inconveniencies and Difficulties daily arise in the obtaining Change for the same; and that there being a Disproportion between the Value of the said large Pieces, and the lesser Pieces of Foreign Gold Coin, to the Advantage of the larger, the same has occasioned likewise a Scarcity of the lesser Pieces of Gold Coin, by Means whereof, great Distress has been brought upon the Trade, and particularly the Linnen Manufacture of this Kingdom; and also upon his Majesty's Forces here: And therefore humbly prayed, that the Gold Coin, both English and Foreign current here, might be rated at the Quantity of English Silver they usually pass for in England, with an Allowance of some small Advantage to the lesser Pieces.

And whereas the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury (to whom his Majesty thought proper to refer the Consideration of the said Representation) have reported to his Majesty in Council, that they had taken the Opinion of the late Master-Worker, and the rest of the principal Officers of his Majesty's Mint thereupon, who proposed that a Reduction should be made in the Value of the Gold Coins current in this Kingdom, at least as low as they are in Great Britain; and that the Disproportion between the larger and lesser Pieces should be rectified; which said Proposal being agreed to by the said Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and approved of by his Majesty in Council, his Majesty has been graciously pleased, by his said Order in Council, to order, that the following Pieces of Gold Coin current in this Kingdom, do pass in Payment within this Kingdom, at the Rates herein after respectively specified, and that a Proclamation should be issued to that Effect.

We therefore the Lords Justices and Council, in Obedience to his Majesty's said Order, do by this our Proclamation publish and declare, that the several Pieces of Gold Coin herein after mentioned, shall from and after the Tenth Day of September next, pass and be accepted in all Receipts and Payments, as well to and from his Majesty as otherwise howsoever, as current Money within this Kingdom, at the several Rates herein after respectively specified, and none other, that is to say,

The Guinea at one Pound two Shillings and nine Pence.

And all other Pieces of the same Species in Proportion.

The Moydore, weighing six Penny-weight Twenty two Grains, at one Pound nine Shillings and three Pence.

The Half Moydore, weighing three Penny-weight eleven Grains, at fourteen Shillings and eight Pence.

The Quarter Moydore, weighing one Penny-weight seventeen Grains and an Half, at seven Shillings and four Pence.

The Quadruple Pistole of Gold, or Doubloon, weighing seventeen Penny-weight eight Grains, at three Pounds thirteen Shillings.

The Spanish or French Double Pistole of Gold, or the Doubloon or Double Louis d'Or, weighing eight Penny-weight sixteen Grains, at one Pound sixteen Shillings and six Pence.

The Spanish or French Pistole of Gold, weighing four Penny-weight eight Grains, at eighteen Shillings and three Pence.

The Spanish or French half Pistole of Gold, weighing two Penny-weight four Grains, at nine Shillings and two Pence.

The Spanish or French Quarter Pistole of Gold, weighing one Penny-weight two Grains, at four Shillings and seven Pence.

The French Louis d'Or of the new Species, weighing five Penny-weight five Grains, at one Pound two Shillings.

The French Half Louis d'Or of the new Species, proportionably, weighing two Penny-weight fourteen Grains and an Half, at eleven Shillings.

The French Quarter Louis d'Or of the new Species, proportionably, weighing one Penny-weight seven Grains and a Quarter, at five Shillings and six Pence.

The Piece of new Gold Coin of Portugal, weighing eighteen Penny-weight ten Grains and an Half, at three Pounds seventeen Shillings and eight Pence.

The Piece of new Gold Coin of Portugal, weighing nine Penny-weight five Grains and a Quarter, at one Pound eighteen Shillings and ten Pence.

The Piece of new Gold Coin of Portugal, weighing four Penny-weight fourteen Grains and an Half, at nineteen Shillings and six Pence.

The Piece of new Gold Coin of Portugal, weighing two Penny-weight seven Grains and a Quarter, at nine Shillings and ten Pence.

The Piece of new Gold Coin of Portugal, weighing one Penny-weight three Grains and an Half, at four Shillings and eleven Pence.

And in Case any of the aforesaid Pieces of Foreign Gold shall want of the respective Weights herein before mentioned, then Allowance is to be given of two Pence for each Grain, one Penny for Half a Grain, and one Half-penny for one Quarter of a Grain so wanting in any Piece of the said Foreign Gold Coins, and so proportionably for every greater want of Weight in the said Pieces; and in Case such Defect of Weight as aforesaid, shall be supplied in Manner aforesaid, then and in such Case, every Piece so defective in the Weight as aforesaid, and that Defect of Weight so supplied as aforesaid, is to be henceforth allowed, and to pass as current Money as aforesaid.

And

And we do hereby declare, that all the aforesaid Foreign Coins, being standing Weight, are to pass, and are to be paid and received at the Rates herein above mentioned; and that any such Coins not weighing down the Scales in the Weighing thereof, is not to be any Cause for the Refusal thereof at the Rates herein above mentioned: As also, that any Person receiving any Money, shall receive by what Side of the Scale he pleases, if he uses those of the Payer; and if he uses his own, then he is to receive by which Side the Payer shall think fit to direct.

And it is hereby declared, that the Weights now in Use in this Kingdom, and which are agreeable to the Standard remaining with the Clerk of the Council, the Chief Baron of his Majesty's Court of Exchequer, and the Receiver General of this Kingdom, and no other, except as herein after is mentioned, shall continue to be used for weighing the several Sorts of Coin abovementioned, as formerly.

And for the better ascertaining the Weight of the said Coins, we have directed one Weight of half a Grain, and one Weight of one Quarter of a Grain, to be exactly made by William Archdall of the City of Dublin, Assay-Master; and that the Standards of such Weights be lodged where the Standards of the other Weights now in Use are kept, there to remain, to the End that all Differences that shall happen about the said Weights, may be either determined or prevented.

And in Case any Person or Persons shall either Pay or Receive any of the said Coins by any other Weights than such as shall be agreeable to the said Standards, they are to be proceeded against according to Law, as Keepers and Users of false and unlawful Weights.

And we do hereby strictly Charge and Command, that no Person, except the said William Archdall, do presume to make, adjust, or sell any of the said Money Weights to be used in this Kingdom, for the future, upon Pain of being proceeded against with the utmost Severity.
