THE Sheriffs of the City of London having waited on his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales from the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen upon the Birth of the Princess, to know his Royal Highness's Pleasure when he would be attended with their Compliments upon that Occasion; his Royal Highness was pleased to acquaint them, that when the Princess of Wales was recovered, he would let them know when it would be proper. Accordingly this Day being appointed by their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, for the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen to attend them, they waited upon their Royal Highnesses at Carlton House near Pall-Mall, and being introduced by Sir William Irby, Bart. Chamberlain to her Royal Highness, Mr. Baron Thomson, the Recorder of the City, made their Compliments to His Royal Highness in the following Speech.

May it please your Royal Highness,

THE Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen of the City of London, having early paid their Duty to their Royal Sovereign, and to her Majesty, upon the Birth of the Princess; if it had been convenient, they would then have humbly begg'd Leave to congratulate your Royal Highness upon so happy an Occasion.

They now, by your Royal Highness's Permission, presume to express their Joyful Sentiments on so fortunate an Event: Fortunate! not only as it has given your Royal Highness this your first-born Princess; but as it yields most probable Hopes of many more Descendants from such illustrious Parents, and a most agreeable Prospect to all his Majesty's Subjects, of the Continuance of those many Blessings, which they have so long enjoyed under the Influence and Protection of your Royal House.

Your Royal Highness having done the highest Honour to the City of London, by most graciously condescending to become a Member of that Body, and having on many Occasions given evident Marks of your Royal Highness's good Will towards them,

The Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen beg Leave to take this Opportunity of renew-

ing their most grateful Acknowledgments; assuring your Royal Highness of their hearty Wishes for your Royal Highness's Welfare and Prosperity, and that they are devoted to your Royal Highness's true Interest and Service, being sincerely attached to the Protestant Succession in your Royal Highness and your Royal Family.

Then to Her Royal Highness, as follows.

May it please your Royal Highness,

THE Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen humbly beg Leave to address themselves to your Royal Highness with their most hearty Congratulations upon your safe Delivery, on the Birth of the Princess, and the Reestablishment of your Health. Your Royal Issue, Madam, will ever be dear to these his Majesty's most faithful Subjects. They now entertain the pleasing Hopes, that many amiable Qualities, Graces and Virtues, derived to the Princess from your Royal Highness, will make her in due Time an Ornament to a Throne, and a Blessing to the World. They presume to add their most ardent Wishes, that your Royal Highness may prove the glorious Instrument of Providence, by yielding a numerous Progeny, to be the Supporters of the Protestant Religion and British Liberty:

And that your Royal Highness may always find in Life, true Joy, lasting Comfort, and solid Happiness.

To which his Royal Highness made this most gracious Answer.

My Lord and Gentlemen,

I return you my Thanks and those of the Princess, for the Share you take in this Increase of the King's Family; and assure you, that whatever Children God may bless me with, I will infuse into them Sentiments agreeable to the Laws and Liberties of that Country they have the Happiness to be born in.

The City has always shewn such Zeal for the King and His Family, that I think it highly incumbent upon me to assure you, that I will be in all Times an hearty Well Wisher for your Trade and Prosperity.

They all had the Honour to kiss their Royal Highnesses Hands.

Vienna, Sept. 14, N. S. This Court has received a Courier from Niemeroff, with Letters of the 26th past, N. S., by which they are informed, that the Russian Plenipotentiaries had delivered to the Turks, what was called their *Ultimatum*, on the 24th; which consists, as is said, in Demands of the formal Cession of Afoph and Oczakow, and to have, instead of the Crimea, the Island of Taman, besides some Districts of Lands in the Neighbourhood of the Boristhenes: That none of the two Parties shall for the future navigate upon the Black Sea with armed Ships; and that if the Tartars should attempt to make new Incurfions for the future upon the Russian Territories, the Czarina may have it in her Power to chastise them as she shall think proper, without being taxed to have broken the Peace between her and the Ottoman Porte. It is assured that the Demands of the Imperial Plenipotentiaries consist only upon *uti Possidetis* at the Time of the Signing; to which it is said that the Turks shew'd no great Reluctancy: But as to the Demands of the Muscovites, they found themselves obliged to send a Courier to Constantinople for new Orders; for which Purpose they desired Passports, as well from the Imperial, as from the Russian Plenipotentiaries, which were granted them. Count Seckendorff is supposed to be on his March towards Zwornick in Bosnia, as is likewise Prince Hildburgshausen: Count Kvenhuller remains with about 12000 Men at Precova, or in that Neighbourhood, in order to cover Nissa, and preserve the Communication with the Danube; and Count Wallis is to be reinforced with 3 or 4000 Men, and to remain in Wallachia and Moldavia. Count Konijslegg Erps, who was formerly at the Hague, set out the 12th Instant for Nancy, in order with Baron Reischack (who is to follow him in a few Days) to regulate the Limits of Lorraine and Alsace; Count Colorado and Baron Palm having declined to be charged with that Commission.
