Ount Sulkowski arrived here on the 9th Instant from Hungary, having lest the Saxon Troops with the Body of the Imperialists which is under the Command of Count Kevenhuller: He flayed four Days at Vienna, and the Emperor made him a Present of a Ring valued at 2000 Florins. Several of the Poles have follicited for the Charge of Great Treasurer, vacant by the Death of M. Mosinsky; but in all Likelihood the King will not dispose of it till the next Diet, and in the mean time he has lest the Administration of that Office to M. Sidnicki, Treasurer of the Court. P.S. Count Rutouski, who commands the Saxon Troops in the Absence of Count Sulkowski, has fent hither a Messenger from the Body of Forces under the Command of Count Kevenhuller, with the News of an Action which has passed between them and the Turks: The Messenger arrived to Day, but proceeding immediately to Hubertsbourg, where the King is at present taking the Diversion of Stag-Hunting, we know not yet the Particulars of that Action.
