*Dresden, October 13, N. S.*

**C**ount Sulkowski arrived here on the 9th Instant from Hungary, having left the Saxon Troops with the Body of the Imperialists which is under the Command of Count Kevenhuller: He stayed four Days at Vienna, and the Emperor made him a Present of a Ring valued at 20000 Florins. Several of the Poles have solicited for the Charge of Great Treasurer, vacant by the Death of M. Molinsky; but in all Likelihood the King will not dispose of it till the next Diet, and in the mean time he has left the Administration of that Office to M. Sidnicki, Treasurer of the Court. P. S. Count Rutouski, who commands the Saxon Troops in the Absence of Count Sulkowski, has sent hither a Messenger from the Body of Forces under the Command of Count Kevenhuller, with the News of an Action which has passed between them and the Turks: The Messenger arrived to Day, but proceeding immediately to Hubertsbourg, where the King is at present taking the Diversion of Stag-Hunting, we know not yet the Particulars of that Action.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Gainsborough Mail or Bag of Letters from Gainsborough to Newark, on Wednesday Evening last, between Five and Six o' Clock, was robbed by one Foot Pad in Knaiß Lane, about three Miles on this Side of Gainsborough, who took from him the said Mail or Bag of Letters, which contained all the Letters sent that Day from Gainsborough for London. The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publickly known, that whoever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will, upon his Conviction, be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Revenue of the Post Office, over and above the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen. Note, The Person who committed this Robbery was a middle-aged Man, low and broad set, with his own brown and lank Hair, a broad Face, and swarthy Complexion, wearing a dark colour'd Coat and Stockings, and a light Waistcoat. There was another Person at the same Time on the Road, near the Place where the Robbery was committed, supposed to be a Confederate, on a Bay Horse, with a light colour'd Great Coat.
