Dresden, October 13, N. S.

Count Sulkowski arrived here on the 9th Instant from Hungary, having left the Saxon Troops with the Body of the Imperialists which is under the Command of Count Kevenhuller: He stayed four Days at Vienna, and the Emperor made him a Present of a Ring valued at 20000 Florins. Several of the Poles have solicited for the Charge of Great Treasurer, vacant by the Death of M. Molinsky; but in all Likelihood the King will not dispose of it till the next Diet, and in the mean time he has left the Administration of that Office to M. Sidnicki, Treasurer of the Court. P. S. Count Rutouski, who commands the Saxon Troops in the Absence of Count Sulkowski, has sent hither a Messenger from the Body of Forces under the Command of Count Kevenhuller, with the News of an Action which has passed between them and the Turks: The Messenger arrived to Day, but proceeding immediately to Hubertsbourg, where the King is at present taking the Diversions of Stag-Hunting, we know not yet the Particulars of that Action.
