Petersbourg, September 24.

LAST Monday a Courier arrived here from Felt Marshal Munich, with Letters dated the 7th Instant from his Camp on the Banks of the River Ingue, not far from the Bog. It is advised, that the Felt Marshal and the Prince of Bevern had been at Oczakow and Kinburn, to examine the Condition of those Places, before their Return with the Army to the Ukraine. The Felt Marshal has put a Garrison of near Ten thousand Men into Oczakow, and has furnished them with great Stores of Provisions, keeping only enough to serve his Troops till they can reach the Russian Borders, where it is thought we shall soon hear they are arrived. As it is not yet possible to judge what will be the End of the Congress of Niemerow, this Court seems resolved to be prepared to carry on the War with great Vigour next Spring, in case a Peace cannot be made on reasonable Conditions this Winter. The Senators have been called to the Cabinet, where it was resolved to raise 40000 Men to recruit the Regiments, and that 30000 Horses shall be bought for the Use of the Army, that eight Prahms shall be built on the River Don of 44 Guns each, as also that forty Gallies, and 400 double Shalloops shall be built on the same River.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of their Majesties Coronation, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green. At Noon there was a numerous Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction to compliment his Grace the Lord Lieutenant upon this Occasion. His Grace was attended with the Guard of Battle-axes, and a Squadron of Horse, and made a Tour upon the Strand; after which his Grace returned to the Castle, where there was a magnificent Entertainment for several of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction: And at Night there was a Play given by his Grace for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and a Ball at the Castle.
