Whereas in the Act of Uniformity, which establishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, Provision is made for such Alterations in the Prayers for the Royal Family, as from time to time shall become necessary, and be directed by lawful Authority: It is thereupon this Day ordered in Council, That in the Morning and Evening Prayers, in the Litany, and in all other Parts of the Publick Service, as well in the Occasional Offices, as in the Book of Common Prayer, where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, the following Form and Order shall be observed, viz.

Their Royal Highnesses Frederick Prince of Wales; the Princesses of Wales, the Duke, the Princesses, and all the Royal Family.

And it is hereby further ordered, That no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed, but with this Amendment; and that in the mean time, till Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates, within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books, according to the foregoing Direction: And for the better Notice hereof, That this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care, that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

ercise of their Religious Worship, and in the Use of the Liturgy of the Church of England; and for repealing the Act passed in the Parliament of Scotland, intituled, Act against irregular Baptisms and Marriages, it is enacted, That every Minister and Preacher, as well of the established Church in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, as those of the Episcopal Communion protected and allowed by this Act, shall at some Time during the Exercise of the Divine Service, in the respective Church, Congregation, or Assembly; pray in express Words for her most sacred Majesty Queen Anne, and the most excellent Princess Sophia, Electress and Dutchess Dowager of Hanover, while living, and all the Royal Family:— In pursuance of the said Act, it is hereby ordered in Council, That henceforth every such Minister and Preacher shall, in his respective Church, Congregation, or Assembly, pray in express Words, For his most sacred Majesty King George, their Royal Highnesses Frederick Prince of Wales, the Princesses of Wales, the Duke, the Princesses, and all the Royal Family. — Of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The Lord Marshal's Order for a General Mourning for Her late Majesty Queen Caroline.

THE 23d Instant Orders were sent from this Office for the Court to go into Mourning on Sunday the 27th Instant; but the

the same being afterwards countermanded, new Orders were issued the 24th, for all Peers and Peereses to appear in Mourning on Sunday the 4th of December; The Ladies to wear black Bombasines, plain Cambrick Linnen, Crape Hoods, Shamoy Shoes and Gloves, and Crape Fans; and for their Undress dark Norwich Crape. The Men to wear black Cloth, without Buttons on the Sleeves or Pockets, plain Cambrick Cravats and Weepers, Shamoy Shoes and Gloves, Crape Handbands, and black Swords and Buckles.

Petersbourg, Oct. 29. This Court has received Letters from Niemerow, dated the 9th Instant, by which they are informed, that all the Plenipotentiaries at the Congress had already quitted that Place, except Baron Tahlman, who was to set out the next Day. The Turkish Ministers are returning home; the Imperial are to stay at Lemberg, and the Russian at Kioff, till they receive Orders from their respective Courts. The Seraskier who was taken Prisoner at Oczakow, arrived here the 23d Instant with a great Retinue, and is very honourably entertained at the Czarina's Expence: As he is looked upon here as a Man of great Consequence, it is not improbable but this Court may make use of him to begin a new Negotiation for a Peace.

Dresden, Nov. 20, N. S. The Saxon Troops in Servia began their March the 5th Instant to go into their Winter Quarters. Count Rutowsky has received Orders to go with those Troops, and dispose them in their Winter Quarters, after which he has obtained Leave to return hither; and the King, who is very well satisfied with the Conduct of that General, is said to have refused to enter into any Negotiation for furnishing Troops for the next Campaign till he arrives here, who will be best able to give an Account of the present Condition of those Troops that remain there, and what Terms will be most proper to insist upon from the Emperor for a further Number. Their Polish Majesties and the Royal Family are returned from Hubertsberg to pass the Winter here.

Copenhagen, Nov. 23, N. S. M. Schuembourg is arrived here from Paris, as is M. Linstow from the Baillage of Colding: The former has left his Family in France, being to return thither, as it is said, very soon; the latter is constituted Master of the Court to the Princess Charlotte. The Post of Master of the Horse to his Danish Majesty, vacant by the Removal of M. Vonder Luke to the Baillage of Roschild, is given to Colonel Kalckreuter, who quits the Command of a Regiment of Cuirassiers, which is probably intended for the Prince of Wirtemberg-Oels.
