An Additional Order concerning the Funeral of Her late Majesty Queen Caroline.

IN pursuance of an Order of a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, appointed to consider of Her Majesty's Funeral; these are to give publick Notice, That it is expected, that no Ecutcheons of Arms, or Arms painted, do appear upon Coaches, Chariots, or Chairs in Mourning, upon the present Occasion of the Death of Her late Majesty, for the first Six Months; and that, pursuant to the Order in Council of the 23d Instant, no Person whatsoever do use any Varnished or Bullion Nails, to be seen, on their Coaches, Chariots, or Chairs, except their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke, and the Princesses.
