A PROCLAMATION,

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS our Parliament, stands prorogued to Thursday the Eighth Day of this Instant December, We, with the Advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said Eighth Day of December, to Tuesday the Twenty fourth Day of January next ensuing; and We have given Order to our Chancellor of Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: And we do hereby further declare our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Twenty fourth Day of January next, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said Twenty fourth Day of January next.

Given at our Court at St. James's, the Sixth Day of December, in the Eleventh Year of our Reign.
