HE Hereditary Provinces have undertaken to furnish 25000 Recruits, partly in Men and partly in Money: There is a Regiment of Dragoons and two Battallions coming from Wirtemberg, and this Court will endeavour to obtain some more Troops from the Princes of the Empire. The States of Silesia have offered to surnish three Millions of Florins. M. Lazenski is in daily Conference with the Ministers for concerting the Operations of the next Campaign; and a Ruffian Colonel, who has been in the Emperor's Army, is to fet out in a few Days for Petersholing with the Refult of those Conferences.
