Efterday the Dreadnought Flight lent in Miwhere in imail Barke, belömping to Boye in Compart, having retaken her from a Durch Caper, iome of whole Men, that were put on board this Vellel report, that they were lately engaged with an English Fright, and elcaped with much difficulty, having had 18 of abei Man killed before fortunities

of their Men killed, besides leveral wounded. Madrid, March 18. From Cadia of the 26 paft, we have advice, that two days before Munfreur Mirtel returned from the South Cape into that 'Bay', having with him 6 Men of War and a Fireship, with feyeral Merchantmen under his Convoy. From the fame, place of the 5 inftant we have advice; that the late bad weather had extreamly shattered and gispersed the Royal Armada, that was gone out in Jearch, of the Galleons; that four of them were put back into that Bay, and 12 into Gibraltar, pe-ing the whole Armada, except two which were aft away; Wefarther hear from Cadi?, that two Dutch Men of War were arrived there from Galicia, and that ao more were daily expected there from Flo-land, besides which, we have advice, that yoing Evenjon is now with 6 Men. of. War at the Cana-ries, and that he is likewile to touch at Cadiz in his return home. From Malaga of the 27 paft we are told, that Capt. Bawen in the Leapard, met about Cape de Gat the Swallow, taken some months fince from the English by the Durch, and brought her into that Port, supposing her still to belong to the Dutch, though in appearnce she seems to have been fince bought by the Genoueles, who failed her.

• Viennia March 16. The Emperor fince the death of his Empreffe 2, continues privately at Schonbrun, till fuch time as his spartment is prepared at Nethfindt, Yefterday about 8 a clock at night the Body of the Emprels decealed, after having been expoled on a. Bed of State, was conveyed to the Capucins Church here for its Enterment; the Solemnity was performed with great Pomp and Magnificence, there having affilted at it 12 Prelats in their Poniifical Habits, with all the Clergy of this place, 28 likewife the Empreis Dowager, and the Atch-Duchefs the Emperors Sifter, together with the Grand Mafter of the Teutonick Order, the feveral Minifters, the Soversign Courts, and all the Officers and Attendants of the Defunct; on the Market place was drawn up the Emperors Guards, and all other matters ordered furtable to the occation.

* Francfort, Mirch 9. The third inflant Jean Hartman de Roseback, Dean of the Chapter of Wirtshurgh was elected Bishop of that See, and Duke of Franconia; the same day was concluded at Maytrice the Solemnity of the inthronization of that Elector, who hath fince received the Homages of his Subjects, and the Congratulations of the neighboring Princes, by the hands of their respective Minifibers. The Prince of Viudemont is-some days fince arrived here from Flanders, to confer with the Duke of Lorrain, who now resides in this Town. The Elector of Brandenburgh is certainly retreating towards Berlin, leaving the French abiolute mafters of the Field as far as the Wefer; It is faid the Imperialists' will quit the Stift Hildesbeim, where they now are, to the Brandenburghs, while they themselves go and seek Quarters in and about Eusseld; or higher up if they can.

Coblentz, March tz. This day paffed By this place in leveral small Boots, 800 French more, being to follow the 4000 that passed down this day levennight, besides which, there lye several thoufand between Sirik and Thionville, who intend in few days to pass likewist through the Bissoprick of Treves, towards the Rhine, so that the French Asmy encreases every day very considerably.

Dortmund, March 17 The Marchal Turennie bas his head quarter still at Socst; it is reported that he will break up in a day or two, though 'as yet we' know not certainly, which way he will take his march.

Minden, March 17. The Elector of Brandenburgh is gone for Berlin, and his Troops are part the Wefer.

Zel, March 17. The Dukes of Lunenburgh have together, brought about 10000 Men on footy to fecure their Countrey sgainft all actidents ; in the means time, the Imperialists and Brandenburgh Troops, in all 20000 Men, are on their march up 1 ward through this Countrey; the Brandenburghs head quarter having been the last night at Saifel fadt.

Ofnabrugh, March 18. Some French Troops had ving lain iome days before the Fort of Ravenjberghj yefterday made themfelves Mafters of it.

Bremen, March 23. The Swedes have defired quarters for a Regiment in Blomendael, a Village not far from hence, which hath given fome jealoufie; Here is a report that the French have made themfelves Masters of Bileveltr.

Cologne, March 24. We have not any frefinnews of the motions of the Dutch or French Atmies ; The Elector of Brandenburgh has put his Iroops in their winter quarters, in the Countrey of Halt berffadi and Magdeburgh, and gives out, that he will come into the Field again by May, with a much fironger Army then he did this laft Summer. Heuxier being now in the French hands, it is reported by fome, that Monfieur de Turenne will pais his Forces over the Stone Bridge there, though othersthink he will march them another way; however, few days may give us more exact information.

Attworp March. 25. Our last Letters from Cologne of the 21 instant, tell us, that Monsieur de Turenne continues still with the French Army near Soeft, having been lately recruited with fevoral considerable supplies which came down the Moselle out of Lorrain; That the Elector of Brandenburgh is on his way to Berlin, and that the Imperialists lie in the Sticht Hildesscheim beyond Paderborn. From Hambrough we have Letters which tell us, that above 12000 of the Lunenburgh and Brunswick Troops lay quartered all along the Wester, to guard the passage of the River, but of this we may export to hear with more certainty.

Middleburgh. March 27. The Prince of Orange is not yet arrived here, though daily expected, tome days fince was made trial of one of thole wooden moving Forts, formerly fpoken of, though it proved not to well as was expected, for notwithflaud ing it was not charged with its complement of Men, and full number of Guns, it could not be got forward, but fluck in the Sand. The owners of the Middleburgh Fregat, the Sammer and the Prince will have leave, notwithflanding the late Placaet, to fir out thole Ships, their defign being to way lay the English Fleet, that they (ay is now expected home from Lisbonne: We begin to work apace every where on our Men of Wai, and in the interim the Drums beat daily for Seamen

Hague, March 26. The States of Holland c ntinue uill atten b'ed, and will to morrow or next day, proceed to the nomination of tuch perfons as are to be employed as Plenipotentiaties on the part of this State at the Treaty at Cologne. Monfieur Waldeck is returned from the Elector of Branden barghs Court, though we cannot learn what he hath effected there: the Prince of Oranges journey to Zealand, is, it is thought put off. We have advice of a Party that having been fent out of Oudewater, met near Hamelen with a party of 170 French, with whom they had a very tharp rencounter, but as is here given out with advantage, having killed above 70 of them upon the place.

Amfterdam, March 23. All hands are fet at work here, to get out our Fleet wich all the speed we can, our Ships are in pretty good foi wardn is, and all our fear is, we may want-Men, however at the worft ; we have refolved to man our Ships with part Landmen, who it is thought will be eafily perfwaded to enter into the Service, by realon of their gre t ftreights, and want of employment at home; Towards the defraying the extraordinary charge of this Equippage, the States have ordered an other, or a fecond payment of the two hundredth penny of all life Rents, Obligations, Ge. which is to be payd by those of the better fort , before the first of the next Month, and by all perfons whatfoever before the 15 of the fame Month : We bave feen great preparations made here these four or five days past, for the making an attempt upon Harderwycke, a finall place in the French hands, not far from hence; great num-bers of fmall Boats weregot ready, and about 4000 Men shipped on them, who were to make the Attack, but the defign did not fucceed, for our Men coming before the place, found it seems the Ene mies in to resolute a posture, that they thought it unfafe to proceed farther, and fo returned back without eff. ding any thing. The discourse of the Elector of Brandenburghs having quitted the Intereft of this State, becaufe of their having, as is faid, not complyed punctually with him, according to the agreement between them, is now in every Mans mouch, and seems to have appearance of tiuth in it, though our Letters from the Hague promife better.

Ditto, March 27. We discourse much of Peace here, and that Cologne is the place appointed for the Treaty; In the mean time we work without inremiffion to get out our Fleet, and all endeavors polfible are used to supply our Ships with Men. The next week will fail the East India Ships, with a Convoy of eight men of War, who in their return home, are to bring with them our Streights and Spanish Fleet: We are now about paying again the two hundred penny, which occasions great complaints amongst the people, who are indeed reduced to

extream wants; and what discourages us most of all is, to see our Allies to backward totaffilt us, the French and Muniter Troops gaindaily some advantage or an other upon the Elector of Brandenburgh, who we hear is himself retired to Berlin. The French are making four Forts at *Htrecht*, for the better defence of the place.

Paris, March 25. On Thursday last the King went to the Parliament, where he was received with thaudual Solemnity, the chief occasion of his going was to let them know, that he expected a Supply of Money from them, proportionable to the extraordinary expences of the War he was now engaged in, in which particular it is not doubted, but they will readily comply with bi- Majelty. Our Letters from the Army of the II inftant tell us, that Monfieur de Turenne continued encamped not far from Soeft ; that he had had a conference with the Bishop of Munster, from whom he had received a particular account of the discovery of the late Conspiracy against his Person, and the City of Munster, and of leveral other matters relating to the prefent Conjuneture; That the Brandenburgh Army, which was in great dilorder, lav quartered in the Bihoprick of Minden on the other fide of the Wefer; fince which we have Letters of the 14 which fay, that the Brand nburgh Troops were broken up from their Quarters in Mind.n, and had taken their way hrough the Territories of the Dukes of Brunfwick , towards, Halber stadt and Mugdeburgh, with inten-tions to winter thereabouts; That the Army under the Command of Monfilur de Turenne, lay for the molt part in the County of Mark, being in very ! good Order, and having abundance of Provisions, and all other necessaries. We are told that the Spanish Ambassador here, hash made complaint to his Majesty , by order of the Queen his Mistrils, of the proceedings of this Court, in confilcating.the Eltates of such persons here in France, as take part and are in the actual Service of the Enemies of this Crown, to which his Majelty has ordered an Aniwer to be made in writing, to justifie himseif in that matter.

Pitto, March 29. Upon the difcourfe we have here, that Cologne is appointed a place for the Treaty, it is faid that the Duke de Chaulne, Mon-J fi ur Courtin, and Monfieur Barrillon; who is now Intendant in Monfieur Turennes Arthy, are to go as Plenipotentiaties on the part of this Crown; The King begins his journey towards the Frontiers on Saturday fortnight, and the Prince of Conde, and the Duke d'Enguyen go hence fome time the next week for Utrecht, where we are told, he will have an Anthy of 2000 Foot, and 10000 Hotfe under his Command. This day their Majefties and the whole Court put on Mourning for the death of the Emprefs.
