**O**N the 17th Instant at Night was solemnized, in the Collegiate Church of Westminster, the private Interriment of Her late most excellent Majesty Queen *CAROLINE* of blessed Memory. The Night before, between Twelve and One a-Clock, the Royal Body was removed in a Hearse from St. James's to the Prince's Chamber adjoining to the House of Lords; being attended by the Countesses of Bristol and Pomfret, Ladies of the Bed-chamber to her late Majesty, in one Coach. Mrs. Herbert Bed-chamber Woman, and Mrs. Purcell Dresser to her Majesty, in another Coach. The Earl of Grantham Lord Chamberlain, the Earl of Pomfret Master of the Horse, and Lord Robert Montagu Vice-Chamberlain, to her Majesty, in another Coach. Gentlemen Ushers and Pages to her Majesty in another Coach. The Gentlemen Ushers and Pages to her Majesty, with one Exempt of the Yeomen of the Guards, staid with the Royal Body till the Funeral. The Ladies of the Bed-chamber, Maids of Honour, and Bed-chamber Women, came to the Prince's Chamber about Eleven a-Clock in the Morning, and staid there till the Procession. Whilst the Royal Body lay in the Prince's Chamber, it was guarded by twenty Gentlemen of the Band of Pensioners with their Axes, who were ranged on each Side the Room near the Body, ten on the Right Side of it, with the Lieutenant of the Band at their Head; and ten on the Left Side of it, with the Standard Bearer at their Head.

The Procession began about Six a-Clock at Night from the Prince's Chamber, and passed through the Old Palace Yard to the Great North Door of Westminster Abbey, all the Way being railed in, and floored, and covered at Top, with Boards; and lined throughout on the Floor, the Sides, and over Head, with black Bays. The remaining Part of the Band of Gentlemen Pensioners, with the Clerk of the Cheque at their Head, marching two a Breast, with their Axes erect. The Yeomen of the Guard closed the Procession.

N. B. The Knights of the Garter, of the Thistle, and of the Bath, who walked in this Procession, wore the Collars of their respective Orders.

As soon as the Procession came to the North Door of Westminster-Abbey, the Lord Bishop of Rochester, as Dean, and the Prebendaries, with the Masters, Scholars, and Choir belonging to the same, and the Choir of the Chapel Royal, attending there in their proper Habits, with Wax Tapers in their Hands, and the Dean and Prebendaries in their Copes; they all joyned in the Procession, next before Norroy King at Arms; and the Moment the Royal Corpse entered the Church, they began to sing the Anthem in the Burial-Service, which lasted till the whole Procession passed thro' the North and South Isles of the Church, to King Henry the Seventh's Chapel. When the Royal Body was set down in that Chapel, the Gentlemen Pensioners, who had marched by it, recovered their Axes, and stood on each Side of the Body in the same Order in which they had marched; and the remaining Part of the Band, led by the Clerk of the Cheque,

drew up in one Rank just within the Door of the Chapel, facing the Tomb of King Henry VII. The Royal Body being placed on Tressels near the Vault, the Crown and Cushion being laid at the Head, and the Canopy held over it by the Gentlemen of the Privy-Chamber, the Chief Mourner, and her two Supporters, with the Ladies Assistant, being seated near the Corpse, and the Lords and others being in the Stalls on each Side of the Chapel, the Dean of Westminster began that Part of the Burial-Office, which is appointed to be read at the Grave: Which being finished, and the Royal Body interred, Garter King at Arms proclaimed Her late Majesty's Titles in these Words: *Thus it has pleased Almighty God, to take out of this transitory Life to His Divine Mercy, the late most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Princess CAROLINE, by the Grace of God Queen Consort of the most High, most Mighty, and most Excellent Monarch, GEORGE the Second, by the Grace of God King of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith; whom God bless and preserve with long Life, Health, and Honour, and all worldly Happiness.* Then followed another Anthem composed on Purpose for this Solemn Occasion: After which, they all returned in the same Order the nearest Way, thro' the Tombs, to the North Door of the Abbey; where the Dean and Prebendaries, the Masters, Scholars, and Choir of Westminster, with the Choir of the Chapel Royal, attended till the whole Procession was gone out of the Church. When the Procession returned, the twenty Gentlemen Pensioners, who had marched on each Side the Body to the Chapel, marched on each Side of the Chief Mourner, her Supporters and Assistants with their Axes erect, and the Lieutenant and Standard-Bearer at their Head, in a Line with the Chief Mourner; the Captain marching immediately behind the Chief Mourner on the Right of her Train: The remaining Part of the Band, under the Clerk of the Cheque, marching immediately behind her late Majesty's Bed-Chamber Women, and before the Yeomen of the Guard, two a Breast, in the same Order they marched to the Chapel.

During the whole Solemnity, the great Bells of the Cathedral of St. Paul and of many Churches in London and Westminster, were tolled. And the Tower Guns kept firing all the while, at a Minute's Distance between each.
