Dresden, that a Marriage is agreed upon, between Don Carlos King of Naples and Sicily, and the Princess of Saxony, otherwise called the Princess Royal of Poland. The last Resolution of the States General relating to the Affair of Bergues and Juliers, has been delivered to the Imperial and French Ministers, and by them dispatched to their respective Courts.
