Dantzick, March 18. Hague, March 30. This day the States of Holland adjourned till after the Easter Holy days, when they will dispatch those matters which at presentlye before them: We are rold that the Swedish Ambaisadors will take their leave of the States within two or three days, in order to their departure for Cologne, the place appointed for the Treaty, whither they will be foon tollowed by the Plenipotentiaries of this State, which are already neminated, with Monfieur Beverning and Renswoude for Holland Monsieur Haren, lately returned from his Embaily in Sweden , for Friefland , Monfieur Odjke for Zealand, and Monsieur Isbrants for Groningen. We teem here much diffactified with the proceedings ef the Elector of Brandenburgh, who on the other fide complains, that this State hath not made good what hath been lipulated on their part, and particularly in the matter of the Sublicies, of which he fays they are a Million and five hundred thousand Livres in Arrear, the payment of which he presses with much earneitness, telling them that he shall be otherwise obliged to take new Mealures, as may be moft agreeable to his own Interest; in the interim the States expect the return of the Count Waldeck, who bath been lately fent by them to exposulate with his Electoral Highness concerning thele matters, upon whole report, they will take their farther relocations. We talk much here, of our great preparations betik by Sea and Land, and give out, that we shall have this Summer, a better Fleet at Ses, then we ever had yet, and that by Land we shall have on foor, 76000 Infantry, 13943 Cavalry, and 2000 Dragoons, whether this will be fo or not, to before the people pay for it; The last Taxof the two himdredth penny, is said to have amounted to 19 Millions, and will be renewed as often as there thall be occasion, which together with the other Taxes that are now on foot, is calculated to be the third of every Mans Estate every year.

Ditto, The Prince of Orange hath Commanded all Officers to repair immediately to their several Commands; ten thousand Horse are marched for Frie fland, for the conveniency of quarters, all the Countrey in this Provincelying under water, fo that an Army will not be able to subsist. The Prince 15' raising a new Fort at Neverbragge, where his chief Post was all the last Summer, and intends to make it larger and more regular then the former, that was destroyed by the French; which will not onely be of security to that place; but likewise to Atsen, where his head quarter is at present.
