**T**HIS Day the Reverend Dr. Richardson, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, presented to his Majesty a Book of Verses from the University, and at the same Time their humble Address, on Occasion of the Death of her late Majesty; which his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously: He was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, and High Steward of the University, and had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand.
