**C**OUNT Coloredo set out on the 28th past for Manheim, where he is to be before the 10th Instant, in order to deliver to the Elector a Memorial about Bergue and Juliers, and afterwards he is to go to several other Courts of the Empire. M. Zech, the Saxon Envoy, is to leave this Court this Spring, and M. Erff, who was formerly in his Britannick Majesty's Service as Elector, and who has actually been made Councillor of State to the King of Poland, will succeed Baron Zech. M. de Lenthe, that King's Electoral Minister, arrived here on Wednesday last, and he is now busy in taking his Audiences, and making his first Visits of Ceremony to all the Ministers.

*Dresden, Feb. 5, N. S.* M. Fuenclara, who is to come hither with the Character of Ambassador and Plenipotentiary both from Spain and Naples, has sent a Messenger to this Court from Vienna, desiring Passports from this Place, and he writes that he designs to set out from Vienna the 15th Instant, and has sent Don Carlos's Picture for the Princess Maria Amelia. The King has given Orders to the Council of War to take an exact Account of the Number of his Forces, which, it is supposed, is in order to find Means in what Manner they may recruit their Troops in Hungary, though it is not said that this Court is as yet come to any Agreement with the Imperial Court thereupon.

*Hague, Feb. 14, N. S.* There have been of late in Guelderland some Disorders between some of the Subjects of that Province, and those of the King of Prussia, a certain Number of the first having entred the Territory of that King, and violently taken away the Goods adjudged for Debts, belonging to a private Man, who had retired thither, with those Goods from Guelderland: Which

Proceeding will certainly occasion some Complaints from the King of Prussia, and is generally disapproved here. The States of Holland continue their Assembly upon their Domestick Affairs, but will probably separate To Morrow. The States General have issued out a Placart, appointing the 5th of March to be a Day of Fasting and Humiliation throughout the Seven Provinces.
