HE Sovereign having determined to hold a Chapter of the most Noble Order of the Garter, and the Knights Companions relident in and near London, being summoned to attend here this Day, there appeared habited in their Mantles the Knights herein after mentioned, with Garter King of Arms, and the Gentle-man Usher of the Black Rod, in their respective Mantles, and wearing their different Badges, who waited the Sovereign's coming; and upon his Appearance, Garter by the Sovereign's Command called over the Names of the Knights Companions present, beginning with the Juniors in the Order, who thereon proceeded from the Apartment next to his Majesty's Closet, to the Council-cham-ber (where the Chapter was held) in the fol-lowing Method, where the Juniors went first, and the Knights whose Companions in the Stalls opposite to them were absent, went fingle.

The SOVEREIGN.

Upon entring the Council-chamber, the Knights stood behind their several Chairs (placed there as the Time of holding of the Privy Council) till the Sovereign had seated himself in the Chair of State at the upper End of the Table, and then by his Majesty's Leave took their Chairs. Then Garter with Reverence acquainted the Sovereign, that the Bishop of Winchester attended at the Door, and humbly befeeched his Majesty to be admitted to take the Oath of Prelate enjoyned by the

Statutes. Then the Bishop, in his Episcopal Habit, by the Sovereign's Command, was introduc'd between Garter and the Black Rod, Garter carrying his Mantle and Badge; and being come to the Sovereign, Garter invested him with the Mantle, and the Oath of Office being administred to him kneeling, Garter on his Knee presented to his Majesty his Lordship's Badge, which the Sovereign put round his Neck. Then the Preslate with Reverence acquainted the Sovereign, that the Bishop of Salisbury attended at the Door, who being introduced, took the Oath of Chancellor in the like Manner. Then the Chancellor, by the Soverign's Command, declared his Royal Pleasure, that one of the vacant Stalls at Windsor should be filled; and each Knight Companion having wrote down the Names of nine Persons, that is of three Earls, or those of an higher Degree, three Barons, and three Knights whom they esteemed qualified to be elected, and having severally subscribed their Hands, and the same being collected by the Chancellor, and presented by him on his Knee to the Sovereign, who after inspecting them, commanded the Chancellor to declare William Earl of Essex duly elected. Upon which, Garter accompanied with the Black Rod, was sent to introduce his Lordship, who being brought to the Door of this Chapter Room, was there received at the Entrance by the Earl of Wil-mington and Sir Robert Walpole the Junior Knights, and conducted by them to the Sovereign with the accustomed Reverences, Garter King of Arms carrying the Garter, the Enfign of the Order, and a Gold George hanging to a blue Ribbon, did upon his Knee present the Garter to the Sovereign, who delivered it to his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland and the Duke of Argyll, the two Senior Companions, which they buckled about the Left Leg of his Lordship, while the Chancellor read the Admonition enjoyned by the Statutes; and then Garter having with like Reverence presented to the Sovereign the Blue Ribbond with the Gold George pendant thereto, his Majesty, assisted by his Royal

Duke of Argyll, put it over his Lordship's Left Shoulder, who was then Kneeling, the Chancellor during that Time reading the Admonition enjoyned in that Case. And his Lordship having kissed the Sovereign's Hand, and thanked his Majesty for the great Honour done him, rose up and saluting all the Companions severally, who made their Congratulations, his Lordthip then withdrew.

The Chancellor then declared his Majesty's Pleasure for filling the other vacant Stall; and whereas the Statutes forbid the Name of any Person to be put in the Scrutiny unless he hath actually received the Honour of Knighthood, Garter was commanded to bring in the Earl of Waldegrave, who being introduced between Garter and the Black Rod, kneeled down before the Sovereign, and being Knighted with the Sword of State, retired; and the Scrutiny being collected by the Chancellor, and delivered to the Sovereign in the former Manner, the Chancellor by the Sovereign's Command declared the Earl of Waldegrave duly elected, who being introduced and invested with the like Ceremonies, withdrew.

Garter then called over the Names of the Knights Companions, and thereon the Procession was made back to the Apartment next to his Majesty's Closet in the Manner before

described.
