The 3d Infant being the Anniversary of the Czarina's Name Day, all the Foreign Ministers and Ruffian Nobility went in the Morning to make their Compliments to her Majesty, and the Foreign Ministers were invited to dine at Court. In the Evening there was a Ball; and

the Town was finely illuminated.
