Petersbourg, February 7.

General Botta, and two of the Emperor's Counsellors of War, are daily expected here from Vienna. They are sent to concert Measures with this Court for the Operations of the next Campaign, and to endeavour to persuade the Czarina to send a considerable Body of her Troops to Walachia, by the Way of Poland; which it is thought this Court will not consent to do, her Majesty not being willing to give the Poles any just Cause of Complaint. It is said, that lit Cafe a Peace is not made this Spring, or at least before the Opening of the Campaign, that Felt Marshal Munich is to march, as soon as the Season will permit, to Oczakow, and from thence, either to Bielgorod on the Dniester, or to Bender on the same River; and Felt Marshal Lacy is to return with his Army to the Crimea, and begin his Operations by the Siege of a little Place three Wersts from Kersch, called Genicula, where there is a good Harbour. The 3d Instant being the Anniversary of the Czarina's Name Day, all the Foreign Ministers and Russian Nobility went in the Morning to make their Compliments to her Majesty, and the Foreign Ministers were invited to dine at Court. In the Evening there was a Ball; and the Town was finely illuminated.

Vienna, Feb. 26, N. S. Count Neuperg is not yet yet set out for Temeswaer. There has been a little Action in Bosnia upon the River Drina near Ratska, between the Rascians and a Body of Turks, who were building some Ships upon that River. It is said that the latter have lost 2 or 300 Men, and that the Ships have been burnt.

Dresden, March 5, N. S. The Count de Fuenclara arrived here from Vienna the 27th of last Month, with the Character of Ambassadour from Spain and Naples. This Court have been employed ever since his Arrival to fix the Time for the Marriage, which the Ambassadour desired should be next Month, because of the unhealthy Traveling in the Heat of the Summer in Italy, and especially about Naples; however, the King has prevailed upon him, as it is said, to consent to defer it till the Beginning of May.

Hague, March 11, N. S. We have Advice by our last Letters from Vienna, that M. Hamel Bruyninx, Minister of the States General at that Court, was dead there after a long Illness. The States of Holland are to meet To-morrow.

Whereas the Post Boy bringing the Bristol Mail to London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person on Foot, Yesterday about Seven o'Clock in the Evening; at the End of Sunning Lane, two Miles on this Side of Reading.
