**U**PON the Duke of Courland's receiving some Days ago Advice, that a Prussian Officer had entered his Territories, and taken away by force a Tall Man, and wounded the Man's Wife, who endeavoured to rescue him; his Highness sent immediately one of his Secretaries to Baron Mardefeldt, to desire him to inform the King his Master, that he insisted on having his Subject sent back, and Satisfaction given him for this Act of Violence. Prince Charles, the Duke of Courland's youngest Son, is at present ill of the Small-Pox, but in a fair Way of Recovery. General Botta arrived here the 10th Instant from Vienna with a Secretary of War.

*Dresden, March 12.* The Ministers here are at present entirely taken up with the Spanish Ambassadour, to regulate all things for the Marriage and Departure of the Princesses. We are informed here, that the Russians design to open the Campaign early, will begin with Bender and Choczim, and will march through a Part of Poland.
