## A PROCLAMATION,

*For putting in Execution the late Act against retailing of Spirituous Liquors, and for protecting the Officers of Justice, and all others in their just and laudable Endeavours, to assist the Magistrates therein, and for suppressing all Combinations and Confederacies, to encourage Disobedience to the said Law; and for punishing all Attempts by Riots, or otherwise to insult and abuse those who give Informations, and make Discoveries of the Offenders against the said Act; and for putting in Execution the Act of Parliament made against Riots, in the First Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First.*

**W**Hereas in order to put a Stop to the pernicious Practice of common and excessive drinking of Brandy, Geneva, and other Spirituous Liquors, so destructive of the Health, Morals, and Industry of our Subjects, and so manifestly injurious to the publick Peace and Tranquility, an Act of Parliament was made in the Ninth Year of our Reign, intituled, An Act for laying a Duty upon Retailing of Spirituous Liquors, and for licensing Retailers thereof; whereby all Persons are prohibited to sell or retail the same in less Quantity than Two Gallons, without Licence, in such Manner as is therein directed, and upon the Penalties thereby inflicted: And whereas by the Diligence of the proper Officers, and others of our good Subjects, on whose Informations alone the said Act can be carried into Execution, and by the Punishment of divers Offenders against the said Law, the same has, in a great Measure, had its desired Effect: And whereas it has been represented to us, That divers wicked and ill-designing Persons, out of Regard to their own private Gain, though to the Destruction of their Fellow Subjects, in order to defeat the wise and good Ends of the said Act, and to restore and encourage the said Practice of common and excessive

drinking Spirituous Liquors, have, of late, excited and encouraged divers Riots and Tumults on Occasion of the arresting and prosecuting Offenders against the said Act, and have formed Conspiracies and Combinations among themselves for the Encouragement of such Offenders, by large Contributions to such of them, who have been prosecuted and convicted; and that great Endeavours have been used by such and the like Practices, to encourage those and others in their Disobedience to the said Act: And whereas it has been represented to us, That divers disorderly, wicked, and malicious Persons have lately, within our City of Westminster, and the Liberties thereof, and in other Parts of our Realm, in a tumultuous and riotous Manner assembled themselves, at various Times, to rescue Offenders against the said Law, and to insult and abuse those who have been concerned in bringing them to Justice; and have in a most wicked, cruel, and outrageous Manner, in open Defiance of the Law, assaulted, beat, wounded, and almost murdered several Officers, and others of our good Subjects, who have, in Pursuance of the said Act, given Informations before our Justices of the Peace against such Offenders: And whereas by the known Law of this our Realm, all Persons who are contriving, aiding, assisting, abetting, promoting, or encouraging such Riots, are guilty not only of such Riots, and thereby liable to the severe Punishments inflicted on such Crimes, but also are guilty of all the immediate Consequences thereof, in the beating, wounding, or killing any Person, though they may not be personally acting therein, and whether the Persons so beat, wounded, or murdered, be any of the Rioters themselves, occasioned by their own Resistance, or any others against whom such Riots are raised, and are liable equally with the immediate Actors, to the Punishment of Death, or otherwise, according to the Nature of the Crime: And whereas by another Act of Parliament made in the First Year of our late Royal Father's Reign, intituled, An Act for preventing Tumults and riotous Assemblies, and for the more speedy and effectual punishing the Rioters; it is enacted, That if any

any Persons, to the Number of Twelve or more, being unlawfully, riotously, and tumultuously assembled together, to the Disturbance of the publick Peace; and being required or commanded by any one or more Justice or Justices of the Peace, or by any of the Officers therein mentioned, by Proclamation to be made in the King's Name, in the Form by the said Act directed, to disperse themselves, and peaceably to depart to their Habitations, shall, to the Number of Twelve, or more, remain and continue together, for the Space of one Hour, after such Proclamation made; then such continuing together shall be adjudged Felony, without Benefit of Clergy, and the Offender shall suffer Death without Benefit of Clergy: And whereas, we being desirous of promoting the useful Purposes of the said Acts, and encouraging Obedience to the Laws of the Land, on which alone, under God, the Peace of our Kingdom, and the Lives, Liberties, and Properties of all our Subjects depend, are firmly resolved to cause the said Acts to be effectually put in Execution, and to protect all our Officers, and Ministers of Justice, and all other our Subjects whatsoever, in their Endeavours to assist our Magistrates therein, and especially in the rendering effectual the said Act of the Ninth Year of our Reign: And being desirous, out of our Fatherly Tenderness to our People, that none of our Subjects may be ignorant of the same, or of the great and inevitable Danger and Punishment to which they expose themselves, by such wicked Practices, or unwarily subject themselves to the Penalties of the Law, have thought fit, by the Advice of our Privy Council, to issue this our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do presume to commit, or attempt any Act, Matter or Thing, contrary to the said Acts of Parliament, and the true Intent and Meaning thereof; and that the same be punctually observed and kept, upon Pain of the several Penalties by the said Laws inflicted upon Offenders against the same: And we do hereby further strictly command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever do presume to kill, maim, wound, beat, or evil intreat any Officers, or any other of our Subjects whatsoever, who shall give Information of any Disobedience to the said Act of the Ninth Year of our Reign, or to any other of the Laws of this Realm: And we do hereby strictly command, that no Person or Persons do presume to assemble in any riotous, tumultuous, or disorderly Manner, in order to beat, wound, kill, or evil intreat, in any Respect whatsoever, any Person or Persons who shall give such Information, or to advise, join in, or with, or encourage any such riotous or tumultuous Assemblies, or to form, support, or pursue any such Conspiracy, Agreement or Combination, for encouraging the Breach of the said Law, or to give or contribute any Money or other Reward for such Purposes, or to aid, abet, or comfort any such Offenders, in or on account of their Disobe-

dience thereto, upon pain of the several Penalties and Punishments inflicted by the Laws on such Crimes, and upon further pain of incurring our highest Displeasure. And we do hereby strictly command and require all our Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under-Sheriffs, and Officers whatsoever, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to put the said Laws in Execution against all Offenders whatsoever, and that such Offenders be prosecuted and punished with the utmost Severity and Rigour of the Law; and do charge them and all our Subjects whatsoever, that they do their utmost to discover and apprehend all such Persons as have been or shall be guilty, or otherwise concerned in any of the said Riots, Tumults, or Offences, in order to put an effectual Stop to such wicked and abominable Practices; and in so doing We do hereby promise our Officers, Magistrates, and all other our Subjects, our Royal Countenance and Protection.

*Vienna, March 8. N. S.* Count Seckendorff has been again personally examined three Times this Week by the Commissioners, who are now to make their Report to the Council of War, and that Council will make another to the Emperor, with their Advice upon that Affair, which will then be decided by his Imperial Majesty. Sentence has been pass'd, and confirm'd by the Emperour, against Major General Doxat, and the Officers who were with him at the Surrender of Nissa; importing, That the said Major General Doxat de Mores shall be beheaded, and all his Effects that can be found shall be confiscated, Part of which Effects are to defray two thirds of the Charge of the Process before the Council of War, and the rest towards making good to the Imperial Treasury the Loss of Stores of Ammunition or of Provisions at the delivering up of Nissa: That Colonel Humbracht, who commanded the Imperial Regiment of Maximilian Hesse, having first taken an Oath *de non offendendo*, shall be cashier'd with Infamy: That Lieutenant Colonel Bina, and Major Butler, of the same Regiment, shall both be cashier'd, but without Blemish to their Honour: That M. Martin, who was Captain of the Artillery at Nissa, shall be confined in Prison three Months, his Feet and Hands iron'd: That the Captains, Lieutenants, and Ensigns of the Regiments which were at Nissa, shall all be put in Irons, some for one Month, others for two: But all the Battallions shall be declared guiltless, and free from any Punishment. A Major Ingenier and a Captain Ingenier, are to be cashier'd, without Blemish to their Honour: The rest of the Officers Ingeniers are to be imprison'd for a Time, and fined each according to his Rank, towards defraying the other Third of the Expence occasioned by the Process.
