HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion; and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for laying a Duty of two Pennies Scots, or one sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, upon every Scots Pint of Ale and Beer which shall be brewed for Sale, brought into, vended, tapped, or sold within the Town of Aberbrothock, and Liberties thereof.

An Act for repairing the Road leading from the Trent Bridge in the County of the Town of Nottingham, (through Costock, otherwise Cortlingstock Lane) to the Bridges commonly known by the Name of Cotes Bridges in the County of Leicester.

And to one private Bill.

Petersbourg, Feb. 25. Prince Charles, the Duke of Courland's youngest Son, is perfectly recovered of the Small-pox. On Sunday the 19th Instant, two Deputies from the Nobility of Courland had an Audience of the Czarina, to thank her Majesty for the Care she had been pleased to take to secure to them their ancient Privileges, and the Liberty of a free Election: And the next Day they had an Audience of their Master the Duke of Courland. A Courier arrived here Yesterday from Felt Marshal Count Munich, with Advice, that the Tartar Chams of Crimea and Budziak, with about 40 or 5000 Tartars, and 15000 Turks, having advanced near the River Donetz towards Ilum, Ten thousand of them, commanded by

Kalga Sultan, a Relation of the Cham of Crimea, attacked on the 15th Instant the Russian Lines, but were repulsed by Lieutenant General Douglass and Major Generals Filofose and Spiegel, after having lost 5 or 600 Men; and the Kalga Sultan's Standard and Baggage. As a Body of Russian Troops commanded by Felt Marshal Munich were pursuing the flying Tartars when the Courier came away, another is daily expected with a more particular Account. The Prince of Bevern set out from hence Yesterday, in order to go to the Army. A great Number of Cannon and Mortars, &c. are sent from this Place and from Moscow to Perevolotchna, and three Days ago two English Captains of the Fleet, named Masters and Talbot, went from hence with some hundred Seamen, who are to be employed on the River Nieper in case the War continues.

General Post Office, Feb. 22, 1737:

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Bristol Mail to London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person in Foot, Yesterday about Seven o'Clock in the Evening, at the End of Sunning Lane, two Miles on this Side of Reading. The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publickly known, that whoever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will, upon Conviction, be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, besides the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Accomplice in the said Robbery shall make a Discovery of the Person who committed the Fact, such Accomplice will be entitled to the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon. The Person who committed this Robbery, is described to be a middle-sized Man, had on a great Riding Coat, with a whitish Velvet or Plush Cape; he carried off the Horse and Mail, which Mail contained the following Bags.
