*Vienna, March 15, N. S.*

**T**HE Sickness which had lately caused some Uneasiness in Transylvania, has entirely ceased; but there is an Account from Temelwaer, that a whole Battallion of Count Grun's Regiment has been attacked by a sort of an Epidemical Distemper, which has obliged the Government there to encamp and barricade that Battallion in the Fields, as well as to block up some Villages in the Neighbourhood for the same Reason; But it is hoped that the Spring Season will put an End to this Sickness.

*Vienna, March 19, N. S.* A Courier who arrived here on the 17th Instant from Belgrade, has brought Advice, that the Turks have besieged Uitzra, with a Body of about 4 or 5000 Bosniaks; but besides, that the Garrison of 200 Men; regular Troops, had been exchanged a few Days before, and that a good deal of Provisions were carried into the Place at the same Time; it is likewise assured, that two or three Hundred Rascians threw themselves into it with a further Supply of Provisions, at the Approach of the Turks; so that it is hoped the Place may easily hold out three or four Months, when it may be succoured. The same Courier has brought Advice of some Appearances of Sickness in Belgrade, and of the Continuation of it at Temelwaer; and as all the Rivers, especially the Save, the Theys, the Verbas, and the Drina, are already overflowed, we are not without some Apprehensions that the Air may be still more infected this Year than it was the last.

*Dresden, March 19, N. S.* Count Frise, Governour of this Town, has received the Command of the Regiment of five Battalions which Count Sulkowski had; so that now all his Employments are disposed of except the Command of the 1200 Saxons which are in Poland, and it is thought that Command will be given to General Fleming, Commander of the Lithuanian Guards. This Day the Contract of Marriage between the Princess Royal and Don Carlos was signed by the Princess. The Prince Royal

will accompany his Sister as far as the Frontiers of Naples, from whence he will continue his Journey to Fchia, under the Name of Count de Lusace, to make use of the Baths there: Count Wakerbath is to attend his Royal Highness. We have just received News that the Palatin of Podlachia, Count Sapieja, is lately dead at Abeville. The Palatin of Lublin, Tarlo, who was Marshal of the Confederation made in Poland in favour of King Stanislaus, has been here some Days, and is going to Luneville to see that Prince.

*The Rt. Hon. the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury having appointed Money for paying of Half Pay to Sea Officers from the 30th of June 1737, to the 31st of December 1737, according to his Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf; These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Treasurer of the Navy's Office in Broad-Street, at Nine a-Clock in the Morning, the following Days, viz. on Monday the 10th of next Month for the Captains, Tuesday the 11th for the Lieutenants, and Wednesday the 12th for the Masters and Surgeons, that all Persons concerned may then and there attend to receive what may become payable to them, and not only bring with them the Affidavits required, touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any publick Employment, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid the said Half Pay, but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths required by Act of Parliament to his present Majesty. And in Case any of the said Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, that the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.*
