Petersbourg, March 4.

THE Czarina has not appeared in publick for some Days, being a little indisposed with a Pain in her Left Arm, occasioned by her having taken Cold; but as the Pain is almost gone, it is said her Majesty will appear to Morrow. Several Couriers are arrived here from Felt Marshal Count Munich, by which this Court is informed, that the Tartar Chams of Crimea, Budziack, and Bielgorod, had with them, when they came to the Borders of the Ukraine about 80000 Men; but as they have been beaten by the several different Parties of Russian Troops and Cossacks that were able to overtake them in their Retreat, it is thought, as the Country is covered with Snow, the greatest Part of those Tartars and all their Horses must perish before they can reach their respective Habitations, the Tartars of Crimea having five or six hundred Wersts to march before they can come to the Perecop, and the Tartars of Budziack and Bielgorod much farther. This Rout or Defeat of the Tartars is looked upon by this Court as an Affair of the greatest Consequence; for they say it will in great Measure extirpate those People, and perhaps oblige the Turks to make up Matters as soon as possible, since they cannot well carry on a War with Russia without the Assistance of such irregular Troops to oppose the Russian Tartars and Cossacks.

Vienna, March 22, N. S. The Bosniacks and other Turkish Militia which had besieged Ufitza, have been obliged to retire for want of Provisions; tho' not without having burnt 500 Houses in the Town of Ufitza, and in the Villages in the Neighbourhood.

Dresden, March 26, N. S. Lieutenant General Stuterhiem is to have the Command of the Saxon Troops in Hungary, and the two Majors General are to be M. Jasinuth and M. Brand. Count Wratislaus gives himself a great deal of Trouble to persuade this Court to recruit those Troops: It would require near 40000 Men to render them as compleat as they were at the Beginning of the last Campaign, and this Court does not ap-

pear at all disposed to be at that Expence: The Palatin of Lublin, Count Tarlo, is set out for Luneville: He has a Pretension of 150,000 Crowns on King Stanislaus, which he spent to serve him in Poland; and which the Court of France has promised shall be made good to him.

The Rt.
