An Act for reviving, continuing, explaining and amending feveral Temporary Statutes, and for other Purpofes therein mentioned.

An Act for the further Improvement and Encouragement of the Fishery of this Kingdom

An Act to repeal Part of an Act passed in the Tenth and Eleventh Years of King Charles the First, intitled, An Act for the Prefervation of the Inheritance, Rights and Profits of Lands belonging to the Church and Perfons Ecclefiastical; and also for the more easy Recovery of Arrears of Rent due to Archlishops and Bishops upon their Translation.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons,
