Petersbourg, March 22.

THE Czarina being pretty well recovered of her Indisposition by a Cold, and of the Pain it brought into her Left Arm, her Majesty appeared last Thursday in publick, to the great Joy of all those who saw her.

Vienna, April 2, N. S. The Regiments of Old Daun and Wurmbrand, as also one Battallion of Salms which is now in Garrison at Friburg, and one Battallion of Welschek which is at Brisac, are ordered to march for Hungary. The Turks are still before Ustizza, notwithstanding the Report which was spread some Days ago of their having abandoned the Siege of that Place. They have already made three Assaults, but the Officer who commands the Garrison has every Time repulsed them with the greatest Bravery. Prince Lobkowitz, who commands in Transilvania, having had Notice that a Body of Turkish Militia was upon the Point of making an Incurision into that Province, took as many Troops as he could soon assemble, and went to encounter them; but the Turks ran away with some Loss of Men and Horses. Prince Lobkowitz's Conduct in that Expedition is much applauded, but no Particulars are published of it hitherto.

Dresden, April 6, N. S. The Prince Royal has been much out of Order with the Head ach for a Day or two, but now the Measles are come out, it is hoped he will be soon re-established in his Health, and able to assist at the Marriage. The Spanish Ambassadour is to make his publick-Entry the 6th of next Month, and the Princes will set out on her Journey about the 14th or 15th.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Bristol Mail to London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person on Foot, Yesterday about Seven o'Clock in the Evening, at the End of Sunning Lane, two Miles on this Side of Reading. The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publickly known, that whomever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will, upon Conviction, be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, besides the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Accomplice in the said Robbery shall make a Discovery of the Person who committed the Fact, such Accomplice will be entitled to the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon. The Person who committed this Robbery, is described to be a middle-six'd Man, had on a great Riding Coat, with a whitish Velvet or Plush Cape; he carried off the Horse and Mail, which Mail contained the following Bags.
