Petersbourg, March 18.

LAST Saturday the Czarina was pleased to make Lieutenant General Keith a General in Chief, and at the same time to send him a Present of 5000 Roubles by Adjutant General Biron, who set out last Sunday for the Army commanded by Felt Marshal Munich. The said Felt Marshal is ordered to assemble his Troops by the 15th of next Month at Perivolotzna, and to march from thence towards Oczakow, as soon as the Season will permit.

Hambourg, April 15, N. S. This Morning died of an Apoplectick Fit, Major General Loos, who was nominated to succeed the late Lieutenant General Albedyl as Commandant of this City. There are now three Vacancies in this Garrison, those of Commandant, Colonel, and Lieutenant Colonel.

Hague, April 18, N. S. On the 15th Instant M. Nieuburg of Leyden, was proposed by the States of Holland to the States General, to be sent to Naples, to compliment the King of the Two Sicilies on the Part of their High Mightinesses: But this Proposition of M. Nieuburg to be the Person to make that Compliment at Naples, meets with Difficulties at present in the Assembly of the States General. The States of Holland will separate To-morrow. It is talk'd that M. Burmania, who resides now at the Court of the Elector Palatine, will be sent to Vienna, to succeed M. Bruyninx lately deceased there, as Minister of their High Mightinesses to his Imperial Majesty. M. Staal, a famous Counsellor at Law of this Place, is made Pensionary of Amsterdamb, in the Room of M. Bassecourt, lately promoted to the Office of Treasurer General.

General Post-Office, Feb. 22, 1737.

Whereas the Post Boy bringing the Bristol Mail to London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person on Foot, Yesterday about Seven o'Clock in the Evening at the End of Sunning Lane, two Miles on this Side of Reading. The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publicly known, that whoever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will, upon Conviction, be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, besides the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Accomplice in the said Robbery shall make a Discovery of the Person who committed the Fact, such Accomplice will be entitled to the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon. The Person who committed this Robbery, is described to be a middle-six'd Man, had on a great Riding Coat, with a whitish Velvet or Plush Cape; he carried off the Horse and Mail, which Mail contained the following Bags.
