THE Court has received a Courier from Transilvania, with Advice of an Irruption made by the Turks into Walachia the latter End of last Month, and that they were put to Flight by General Gylani, at the Head of a Regiment of Hussars and some Militia. The Turks lost three or four Hundred Men, after having plundered and burnt two or three Villages. The Turks are still before Usitza; they have blockaded the Place entirely, and have sent for some heavy Artillery from Zwornick. The last Orders were sent on Saturday last for the March of all the Troops towards Belgrade. The Army is to be drawn together the latter End of May. Count Konigsegg is now so well recovered of the Gout, that he is resolved to make the Campaign, and proposes to set out on the 9th of the next Month. The Grand Duke is to follow him a few Days after. The Siege of Widdin is much talked of: General Bauffe, who is come from the Netherlands to be the first Enginier of the Army, in the Room of the late General Dooxat, makes considerable Demands of Artillery and Stores of Ammunition for that Siege. There will still be another Session of the Commissioners at Count Seckendorff's House, after which it is assured, that the definitive Report will be made as soon as possible to the Emperor. Count Althan, the Emperor's Great Master of the Horse, having desired five Months ago to be discharged from that high Post, on Account of his Age, his Imperial Majesty was at last pleased to dispose of it Yesterday in Favour of Count Stahrenberg. The Envoy of Modena has had Audiences of the Imperial Family, to notify the Marriage of the Prince Hereditary of Modena with the Dutchess of Massa and Carara.
