Vienna, April 12, N. S.

L E T T E R S from Belgrade of the 5th Instant give an Account, that Ufitza was surrendered to the Turks on the 24th of last Month, after a Siege of Twenty two Days. The Bashaw of Zwornick having on the 12th of March reinforced the Besiegers with 7 or 8000 Men, and brought some Pieces of Cannon with him, a Tower, which was the principal Strength of that little Place, was ruined in a few Days by the Fire of those Cannon. However Captain Lersner, who commanded in the Place, continued to defend it, and repulsed the Besiegers in two Assaults they made; but the Turks finding Means to destroy the Conduits which furnished the-Place with Water, the Garrison being in want of it, and reduced to 50 Men, and being without Hopes of Relief, capitulated, and were allowed to march out with Marks of Honour to Belgrade.

Copenhagen, April 15, N. S. M. Walter, from Dresden, is now at this Place on his Way to Stockholm, whither he is going with the Character of Resident from the King of Poland. He presented a Letter of Compliment from his Polish Majesty to the King of Denmark in the Circle, and was afterwards introduced to the Queen and the Royal Family, to whom he made verbal Compliments from his Court.

Dresden, April 20, N. S. The Prince Royal of Poland is so well recovered of his Indisposition, that he will soon leave his Apartments and appear in publick. A Swedish Officer is arrived here from Constantinople; he has brought a Letter from the Grand Visier to the King, representing, that the Port continues to hope Poland will not concern itself in the present War. By the said Officer we learn, that the Grand Signior had intimated, that if the Powers who have offered their Mediation for putting an End to this War had begun by proposing a Suspension of Arms, it might have had a good Effect; but the Operations of this Campaign might give such a Turn to Affairs as might render their Interposition fruitless. That in

this Uncertainty his Highness would omit nothing to put himself into so good a State of Defence, as to be able even to act offensively.

General Post-Office, Feb. 22, 1737.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Bristol Mail to London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person on Foot, Yesterday about Seven o'Clock in the Evening, at the End of Sunning Lane, two Miles on this Side of Reading. The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publickly known, that whoever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will upon Conviction, be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, besides the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Accomplice in the said Robbery shall make a Discovery of the Person who committed the Fact, such Accomplice will be entitled to the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon. The Person who committed this Robbery, is described to be a middle-sized Man, had on a great Riding Coat with a whitish Velvet or Plush Cape; he carried off the Horse and Mail, which Mail contained the following Bags.
