Berlin, April 29, N. S.

A Few Days ago an Express passed through this Town, going to Potsdam from Schwedt, with the News, that the Margravine of Schwedt, their Prussian Majesties fourth Daughter, had been safely delivered of a Princess. On Wednesday last died here Major General Count Truchses: He had been several Times employed as his Prussian Majesty's Minister in Poland and Saxony, and was Colonel of a Regiment of Horse, which has been given to Colonel Wartenleben, a Son of the late Felt Marshal Wartenleben. Prince Czartorinsky, Vice Chancellor of Lithuania, passed through this Town a few Days ago in his Way to Dresden.

Hague, May 6, N. S. The King of Prussia desiring to send from Berlin a large Train of Artillery with Stores of Ammunition to Wesel, it was sent down the Elbe to Hambourg, in order to be embarked there for this Country; and the Prussian Minister here had desired of the States a Passport for the Conveyance of it through their Territories. But we have received Advice, that Part of that Train, consisting of 30 Pieces of Cannon, having been accordingly shipped at Hambourg, in its Passage from thence has been stopped at Gluckstadt by the Danish Governour there, on account of some Neglect or Want of Formalities, such as Requisite Letters, Passes, &c. which are expected when Artillery passes by a Fortress. According to the Advices from Hungary, the Turks are making Incurfions as far as the Suburbs of Belgrade, and threaten to besiege that Town. The States of Holland are to assemble To-morrow.

Whereas by an Order of Council dated the 28th of November 1737, all Lords Privy Counsellors and Officers of His Majesty's and Her late Majesty's Household, were forbid to put on any Escutcheon of Arms, or Arms painted, on their Coaches or Chariots for the first six Months; which Term expiring the 21st of May next, It is His Majesty's Command, that they do cause them to be put on at that Time, or as soon after as conveniently may be.

Whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, That on the Fourteenth Day of this Instant April, in the Evening, a great Number of People assembled themselves in the City of Bristol, in a riotous and tumultuous Manner; that the Magistrates of the said City having caused the Proclamation for preventing Tumults to be read, they dispersed at that Time, but assembled again the next Morning in the same riotous Manner: And whereas an anonymous Letter was, on the 18th Instant, taken up in the Court of the Dwelling-House of Nathaniel Day, Esq; Mayor of that City, threatening him with Mischief, in case he should molest any Person on Account of the said Riots: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the several Crimes above-mentioned, or either of them, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders that shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Riots, or in writing, sending, or dropping the Threatening Letter aforesaid, so that they or any of them be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas a Riot was the last Night committed on the Wear in this City.

This is to give Notice, That if any Person or Persons shall discover any of the Persons concerned in the said Riot, so as he or they shall be convicted thereof, shall receive the Sum of Ten Pounds; to be paid by the Chamberlain of the said City, on such Conviction: And if any Person or Persons, concerned in the said Riot, shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be convicted thereof, shall receive the like Sum of Ten Pounds on such Conviction, to be paid as aforesaid.

Whereas a Letter, without Date or Name, directed to the Right Worshipful Nath. Day, Esq; Mayor, was the last Night, or early this Morning, thrown into the Court of his Dwelling House in Queen Square, addressed in the Words following, viz. "May it please your busie Worship, to be so kind not to trouble your self about what you call a Riot on the Wear as much as you do; if your Worship doth molest any Person, we that did break the Windows of that wicked Creature's House, will certainly do you the same Kindness and something worse the first Opportunity, we doth not question will be in a little Time: We think it Justice to serve her so, and your Worship worse, if you doth not hold your Peace.
"And, I pray, accuse none wrongfully; if you doth, it shall be — Fire to you."

The Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Bristol, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in writing or throwing the said Letter into the Court aforesaid, do hereby promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so
