Petersbourg, April 15.

BY the Accounts this Ministry received some Days ago from Persia, they are informed that Schach Nadyr has for some Time been besieging the Town of Candahar. That the Besieged, though in great want of Provisions, made very vigorous Salleys, and carry'd into the Place all the Horses they could take dead or alive from the Besiegers. Two Persian Ambassadors are soon expected here, being already come to Astracan. As the River Neva opened the 16th Instant, and the Ice and Snow is almost gone, we begin now to see an End of the Winter. Letters from Constantinople of the 28th of March say, that the Grand Vizier marched the 24th from thence; it was thought he would stay some time at Adrianople for the Horses to take green Forage. It was not known on which Frontier he will command. The Turkish Fleet was getting ready with all Diligence; that designed for the Black Sea, was to be commanded by the Captain Pathaw.

Dresden, May 11, N. S. The Spanish Ambassador made his publick Entry on the 7th Instant, but M. Keyserling and M. Rumpf, the Russian and Dutch Ministers, did not send their Equipages to assist at the Entry, because of the Pope's Nuncio; but they sent their Secretaries with their Equipages before the March began, to make him a Compliment. The next Day the Ambassador had his publick Audience of the King, in which he asked in Form the Princess in Marriage for Don Carlos: That Night the whole Town was illuminated, and the Spanish Ambassador caused Money to be thrown to the People, and Wine was set a running for them. The 9th in the Afternoon the Princess was married, the Prince Royal representing Don Carlos by Procuracion; the Pope's Nuncio performed the Ceremony, assisted by the Great Chancellor of Poland; after which the King supped in Ceremony with the Royal Family, the Pope's Nuncio, and the Emperor's and Spanish Ambassadors: As the Russian and Dutch Ministers were not invited to sup with the King, they did not appear that Evening, because M. Keyserling will not give Place to the Pope's Nuncio. Yesterday was the Carrousel and Supper and Ball in the Prince Royal's Apartment. The

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Bristol Mail to London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person on Foot, Yesterday about Seven o'Clock in the Evening, at the End of Sunning Lane, two Miles on this Side of Reading. The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publickly known, that whoever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will, upon Conviction, be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, besides the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Accomplice in the said Robbery shall make a Discovery of the Person who committed the Fact, such Accomplice will be entitled to the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon. The Person who committed this Robbery, is described to be a middle-six'd Man, had on a great Riding Coat, with a whitish Velvet or Plush Cape; he carried off the Horse and Mail, which Mail contained the following Bags.
