General Rendezvous is to be held near this City the 10 of August, all preparations are making in order to it. Our Privateers still continue successful. This Evening a prize of 100 Tun, laden with Oyl, is brought up to Leith, and another of the same lading and bulk taken by Captain Blyth, with another ship of good value going from France, who are this next tide expected at Leith.

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Falmouth, Aug. 1. A private Man of War of one Gun, and 25 Men, Captain Stamford Commander, lying upon the Coasts of France, near Firme Rock, was discovered by the French from shore, who to engage him into their Net, decoy'd him with two finall Veffels which they fent out to draw him nearer danger; and so far their plot took, that the Captain made up to them, as was expected, upon whom they immediately sent out two French Shallops full of small shor, whom the Captain entertained so warmly with his one Gan, and the few men he had, that having fhor down the Mast and Boltspit of one of them, he immediately boarded, killing the French Captain, and hurting feveral of his men; the other Shallop fairly retiring, leaving his companion for a prize, which the Captain brought away with his priloners, not losing one man in the service, and some few onely hurt. In his return, the Patrick borrowed some of his men, and secured his prisoners, the Captain with his prize coming into

Here likewise came in two Vessels of this Harbor from Water laden with Coal; they came yesterday in company with six more, but a French Man of War of ten Guns, and sull of men, off the Lizard, came up with them, and took two of them in their view; whereof one was the Scilly Pacquet Boat of twelve Tuns bound for Plymouth, and supposed one or two more in danger,

This day the Eagle and Guernsey came in here, reporting, that the same Frenchman came up with them on Munday night, but receiving a broadfide, made away with his Oars, and by advantage of them and the night, escaped; but were forced to leave behinde them floating one of their prize Vessels of twelve Tuns, out of which they had not time to take any thing but onely the men.

This day likewise Captain Manning and Hall sent in a prize of Four hundred Tun with Ballast bound for Rochelle, and between Belle Isle and Pennarks, where they lie, have taken two French prizes more laden with Pirch and Rozin. By the men sent in with the prize, we are told that de Beaufort is daily expected at Rochelle, for whose supply, Provisions of all sorts are brought in thither. The Orange and Vistory 4te likewise crusing upon the Coasts.

Whith, August. 3. Several of our Fisherboats inform us that the Dutch Busses, and Doggers are fishing, a little off the Topping of the Land. Yesterday we heard much shooting off at Sea, and hope some of our Fleet may have met their Convo.

Hulb, Aug. 4 A Swedish ship lately arrived here from Coningsberg with Flax, was boarded by a Sloop that frequently plyes off this Harbor, who stripped the Skipper and his Company, and took from them their Money, and some Kaggs of Sturgeon, with such things as they could easily carty off

West-Cower, Aug: 4. On Thu sday last there went out of this Road for London, the St. Patrick of Gallaway, and the Friendship of London from Mallaga, with Wine and Fruit, and the Constant Sarah of London from Guernsey, with French Wines, under Convoy of the Drake Fregat.

Lyme, Ang: 4. The last night arrived here the Harz of this place from the Barbadoes, laden with Sugars. Several Vessels are now in sight bound in hither, which we suppose to be from Guernsey and fersey.

Walmer, August 3. Yesterday came in the Mermaid, Captain Warson Commander, and has brought in with him a Salt Prize.

Rochelle, July 27. Here are two Men of War in this Road, one of 32 Guns, the other 36, with three Flures of 18 or 20 Guns. that with the first sair wind intend to set sail for St. Christophers with some Provisions, and Merchandizes, with an Engineer, and 650 Men for the softifying and strengthning that Island.

A small Tartane arrived here two daies since from Provence, burcame lately from Lisbon, assuring us that Monheur de Beaufort with his Fleet intended to part thence in very little time after him, intending to Victual here, and so to pass towards Belle Isle.

Vienna, July 24. His Imperial Majesty has received Letters from Monsieur Le Comte de Montecuculi, that he is assured by a Barque lately attived at Finale, that the Empress is Embarqued. All the Gallants of the Court are preparing against the Wedding, which will be performed with great splendor and magnificence.

The Cassie called Debry lately taken from Balaffi Imbre, has received an Imperial Garrison, and an Ingineer is sent thither to fortifie it, after the pattern of Leopold.

The Count Scrini by an Express has informed, that the Turks had a design to have surprised some considerable place in Dalmatia: upon the news his Imperial Majesty has sent an Express to Canisia, to remind the Bassa of that place, of the Treaty of Peace between the two Empires.

Ratichone, Angust 4. We have here kept a solemn day of Humiliation, because of the great spreading of the Infection in all parts: Our Diet is breaking up, but some discourse there is of a Deputation General, but they are not yet resolved in what place.

Witzberg, August 5. His Electoral Highness continues still in this City, and in health, no contagion as yet appearing, though of late some houses are suspected in the Town: If the suspicion have any sure soundation, the Elector is resolved to take his journey to Koningskoven, and from thence to Ertford. We talk now more then sormerly of the hopes of a Treaty, towards which the Paximinaries are preparing.

The contagion continues very her in the Palatinate, infomuch, as that Elector has strictly ordered, that no persons shall be admitted into Heideiberg without a full examination. At Monta it has of late decreased, though there still dies 18 or 20 in a day.

T. Thomas Warren an Apothecary, living at the Golden Anchor and Hart in Basing-lane noar Bread-streets is appointed by the University of Cambridge, to receive what the Charity of Well-disposed persons shall invite them to give for the Relief of the Poor of the place, much Fisted with the Sichness.

Hague, Aug. 13. Among other the ill effects of our late unhappy success, it is not the least to find so great a misunder-standing between De Ruyter and Tromp, to a degree irreconcileable; all the industry De Witt can apply, doth not, it seems, lessen it. At Tromps first coming on board de Ruyter, this last received him with downright-reviling, 28 a Traytor and Poltron, and at last commanded him to quit his ship; since, we are told, they have been made to drink together, but parted, it appears since, no better Friends than they H h h h

had met; infomuch, that Tromp should say, He would go no more to Sea-with De Ruy; cr. However, the State frems well fatisfied with De Ruyters carriage, and as much to centure

Tremps in the last Action.

At the instance of Holland, we have resolved to send three Tun of Gold to pay off the Premiums of the former Battel in June; and at the same time, require De Ruyter to call a Councel of War, to pass upon those that have not done their Duty in this last Action, be they who they will. Order is given to all Officers to repair forthwith to their Garrisons and Commands, and to the respective Admiralties to give order to keep strict watch and guard at all the Entries and Passages down to the Sea.

The English Fleet coatinuing to brave it upon our Casts, Order is given for fix Troops of Horle to be lent to guard the Sea-Coasts of this Province, and one for that of Friesland. And to Re-man our Fleet, which is our greatest difficulty, a resolution is taken of reducing 20, or 25 Companies of Foot, and incorporating them with our Sea-torce, that we may not be put to mangle and weaken our other Land-forces on all occzfions.

Fight,

Yesterday the English Fleet was told off of Scheveling, between 60 and 70 great men of War, which indeed is the most convincing Argument to us of their advantage in the lait Butel: But we hope to have our Revenge ere long, Holland still pressing to recover the point of Honor, rather than under this diladvantage to look after a Peace, which wife men counfei.

What will be done at our Councel of War is doubted; not ar all to penish so infamous a Cowardise, were to authorize it to our hazard hereafter in the like occasion: And yet to do it impartially, might endanger two of the only four tryed Commanders we have; for belide Tromp and Meppel, who have reason to sear a severe Councel; if they were brought to it, we have no confiderable Flag-Office: s now left but De

Ruyter and Van Nes.

Middleberough, Aug. 15. Our Fleets are repairing with all imaginable diligence, De Witt having been aboard them, who lie about Flashing; and has taken an Estimate of the damage received, and care is taken for the employing of all the Carpenters that can be gotten from Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and other places, who work night and day with confiderable proficiency. The number that lie between Flashing and Ranmehins, accounted 66 men of War, and 19 Fireflups; but of this number 34 or 35 have their Mills term off, and are extreamly fluttered, and full of holes; mill of the Admirals, Vice and Rere-Admirals, and indeed generally the best ships most damaged; yet 'tis given out, we shall be a-gain at Sea within 15 dayes with near 60 Sail; and if the English will attend us, in a little longer time we may get out 20 more, we having about 30 faips lying in several of our Ports, which by that time may be got to Sea : 5 in the Vlieter are near ready for service, besides 5 orbers in Zealand, 6 in the Meuse, 9 in Amsterdam, 2 at Harlingen, 2 at Horne, 2 at Enchuysen, and I at Medenbleck; of these, 8 or 9 have newly received their Mails and Cordage, and the rest will shortly be famisht. We are every day bearing up for men, the East and West-Frieslanders run fom us in great numbers, though endeavours are used to stop their passage a: Campuecr; but this want we intend to supply out of our Garrisons

Hierlem, Aug. 13. On Wednesday the Bodies of Admirai Tirich Heides, and his Vice-Admiral Goenders, peffed

by this place.

Paris, Aug. 10. We have now advice, that the Queen of Portugal is arrived fate in Portugal.

The Duke de Beaufort has wrote to the King an account of the Fleet, which is in excellent order, and much pleasure he takes in his great Guns, which they discharge in as good order, as the Kings Muskettiers usually do on Land.

The King has tent 200000 Crowns to Lyons which is to be farther employed to appeale the Switz, who are not a little diguitec, that the King is in arrear to them 20 Millions : About waich, they tent an Agent to the Court, who not re-

delving answer, they declared they would no langer depend up on the French Pentions, which makes us a little jealous, that they have been sealt with by other Princes; to fet up an interest against us: But we hope quickly to appeale their anger, and Ex them again in their old posture.

Madrid; July 15. The Duke de Beaufort in h's Trest at Lisbon, was received in quality of his Highnels, and a Chair let for him in the Kings presence; which was so ill resented by the Infanté, that falling foul with the Conde de Castello, 'is faid, the struck him : Whereupon the Countretiring, the King went to feek the Infanté, who by the advice of some friends, retired for some time to Setuval, with the Marquels Marialva, not knowing how far the King might be

transported, for the affront done to his favorite.

Weymouth, August 6. Yesterday arrived here the Nonfuch Ketch, bringing with him a small light French pize bound for Burdeaux, which he took neer the 7 Islands, on the Coast of France, he secured likewise three Ostenders, whom he lest with the Paradox Fregat, who a little before had taken a French Privateer set out at St. Maloes of 6 Gans, and 70 Man, the French maintaining the dispute two hours, till they had loft their Captain, and most of their men : this Vessel had done much hurt upon the Coasts, and had a little

before taken a Love-Vessel, which was again retaken.

Pendennis. August 4. Yesterday came in Captain Hall and Manning with two French Prizes, laden with Pitch and Rezin, and retock a Vessel of this Harbor, formerly taken by a Knight of Malta, having on board his Lieutenant and Enfign, with five more French, whom they found bloody, and firongly suspect they have murdered the Falmouth men belonging to the Vessel, whom they pretended to have fet on shoure at the Ligard, but that proves otherwise, their tremblings and contradictory accounts adds much to the suf-

pition.

Yarmonth, Aug. 6. Yesterday came into this Road the Speedwell and Bittle-Mary with a Salt Prize of 250 Tun, taken by the Mary, going into Rotterdam. On Saturday last they lest the Fleet within five Leagues of the Texell.

On the 2. instant some of our Ships gave chace to a Dutch Merchant, who with much difficulty escaped and gor into the

Macs.

On the 3d, some of our Vessels discovered 7. small F ench ships whom they chaced, Five of them got away into the Texel, the other two they forced aftere; but not being able to get them off, they took out the lading, and fet fire on the Vessels, the men escaping to shore in their Boats.

Dover, August 7. The Lenex Privateer hath taken a Dutch Flyboat empty, of 300 Tuns from Ostend, bound for Franse. Whitehal, Aug. 5. This morning Her Majetty, attended by the Principal Lucies of the Court, returned from Tunbridge to Whitehal, having staid about a moneth in that place to take the waters.

Wednelday, Aug 8. Mr. Peyton was this day brought before the King and Councel, and his Accusation put into Mr. Sollicitors hand, to put in an Information upon it at the Kings

The Farme's of the Customs are upon renewing, and His Majesty this day acquainted the Councel with it; the old Farmers, it feems, give out, and now His Majesty intends to let it to the greatest Offerer. The Farm will be out at Michaelmas Twelve-month.

Notwithstanding the Sickness at Offend, the Trade is al-

lowed to continue with that Port.

Several people at Weymouth are sent up for to the Council for falle news. One Stone, the Post-master there, having reported Sir William Coventry his Royal Highnesses Secretary was committed to the Tower for giving intelligence to the Dutch.

The Datch Trumpetter that came over about Sir William Barkley's Body, having received His Majesties Letter in anlwer to the States on that subject, and a fair piece of Money, is returned this day, having been well lodged and treated at the Kings expence while he was here.
