Petersbourg, May 13.

Courier arrived here last Tuesday from Felt Marshal-Munich, with Letters dated the 27th past, by which this Court is informed, that he is yet near Perevolotzna, and has divided his Army into three Bodies; the first is to be commanded by General Romansoff, the fecond by General Sagraskoy, and the third by Lieutenant General Biron the Duke of Courland's eldest Brother, in case General Keith, who lies ill at Pultawa, is not in a Condition to take the Command; and I ieutenant General Lewendahl is to have the Command of the Artillery. Though the Nights are yet cold, as there is already a great deal of Grass in the Desert, Felt Marthal Munich is resolved to begin his March towards Oczakow, as foon as the Battallion of the Guards, and some heavy Cannon which he daily expects, have joined his Army. Two Days ago another Courier brought Letters from Felt Marshal Lacy, dated at Bach mut the 30th past, at which Time he was just going to begin his March towards the Crimea. It is said, that a very considerable Body of regular Troops, besides a great Number of Don Cossacks, Calmucks, and Tartars, are already gone from Asoph in order to join his Excellency on the Road; and as it is hardly possible that the Cham of Crimea can get together a sufficient Force to oppose the Russian Army, we expect to hear that our Troops, after they have destroyed all the open Country, will attack the Towns of Jenikala and Kertz, and demolish

entirely the Perecop.

Vienna, May 31, N. S. On the 28th at Night young Count Starenberg arrived here from Count Neuperg, with Advice that a confiderable Body of Turks was still in and about Old Orfova, where they had laid a Barricade of Boats over the Danube; and that at another Place called Meadia, a few Leagues Northward of Orfova, the Turks with a Body of 5 or 6000 Men, had attacked Count Picolomini, who was there with a fingle Battalion, and that they had been repulsed twice, or, as some say, thrice, with great Loss. That Place is of no other Consequence in it-felf, but as it opens a Passage to Temeswar; to cover which Place and the whole Bannat, Count Neuperg had, he hoped, made the proper Dispositions. Count Picolomini is Colonel Commandant of the Regiment of Grune, and has gained some Reputation by his late Behaviour. The Grand Duke's

Copenhagen, June 7, N. S. Count Rantzau, the Vice-roy of Norway, has Leave to

return hither upon his private Affairs; and the same Permission is said to be granted, for the like Reason, to Mr. Berkentin at Vi-M. Beylewitz, a Privy Counsellor of the late Duke of Wirtemberg Stutgard, was presented Yesterday in the Circle to his Danish Majesty.
