ON Wednesday last the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of London, being assembled in a full Court at Guildhall, resolved to address His Majesty upon the Birth of the young Prince; and a Committee chosen to draw it up going out, soon returned with an Address, which was unanimously approved, and the two Sheriffs were ordered to wait upon His Majesty the next Day, to know his Royal Pleasure when he would be attended with it by the whole Body. Accordingly the Sheriffs waited on His Majesty, who was pleased to appoint Yesterday: His Majesty was also pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon Mr. Alderman Robert Cater, one of the Sheriffs.

Yesterday the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen and Common-Council, waited on His Majesty at Kensington; when Thomas Garrard, Esq; Common Serjeant of the City of London (in the Absence of Mr. Recorder) presented the following humble Address to His Majesty: They were introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Hervey, Vice-Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common-Council assembled.

May it please your Majesty,
WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen

and Commons, in Common-Council assembled, do with Hearts full of Joy approach your Throne, and humbly beg Leave to offer our Congratulations on the happy Increase of your Royal Family by the Birth of a Prince, and therein the strengthening and establishing the Religious and Civil Rights of this Country, and the Liberties of Europe.

We are so sensible of the many Blessings of your Majesty's reign, that from Interest as well as Duty, we wish it long and prosperous; and when in Course of Time, this Prince shall come to reign, may He, by the Example of his Royal Predecessors, have learn'd to rule a free but obedient People, and become the Guardian of those Liberties, which by their Precepts he will have been taught to protect.

We should be wanting in that Duty we owe to your Majesty, if we did not take this Opportunity of testifying our Joy, and assuring your Majesty of our Fidelity and Affection.

It having been represented to His Majesty, That a most notorious and wicked Practice has of late Years prevailed, and does now particularly prevail, to a very high Degree, in His Majesty's Forest, called New Forest, in the County of Southampton, for Persons unknown, not only to cut down Trees, and Part of Trees, fit for the Service of His Majesty's Navy, but likewise to steal and take away from the said Forest, Timber, after it has been squared into proper Lengths for that Service; and it being apprehended, that the Persons guilty of the said Theft are chiefly encouraged thereto by Persons in the Neighbourhood, who receive the same from them: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Offenders, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of ~~them~~ who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement thereto, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover any Person or Persons, that have stolen, or may hereafter steal, any Timber from the said Forest, as aforesaid, or that have received, or may hereafter receive, any such Timber, knowing the same to be stolen, so that the said Offender or Offenders may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid by the Surveyor General of his Majesty's Woods for the Time being, on the Conviction of any of the said Offenders.

Whereas by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament for enforcing the Laws made for laying a Duty upon Retailers of spirituous Liquors, and for Licencing the Retailers thereof, it is, amongst other Things enacted, That if any Persons, to the Number of Five or more, shall, after the Twenty fourth day of June, One thousand seven hundred and thirty eight, in a tumultuous and riotous Manner, assemble themselves to rescue any Offender against an Act made in the Ninth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for laying a Duty on Retailers of Spirituous Liquors, and for Licencing the Retailers thereof, or to assault, beat, or wound any Person or Persons, who shall have given, or be about to give, any Information or Evidence against, or shall have discovered or given Evidence against, or be about to discover or give Evidence against, seize or bring to Justice any Person or Persons offending against the said Act of the Ninth of His present Majesty, that then all and every Person or Persons, so assembling themselves, and their Aiders and Abettors, being thereof lawfully convicted, shall be guilty of Felony, and subject and liable to the like Pains and Penalties as in Cases of Felony, and may be transported for Seven Years. The Commissioners of Excise

do think it proper to give this publick Notice of the same, lest unwary Persons should incur the Penalties on'dict'd by the said Law.
