Petersboarg, May 20.

THIS Court has received a Courier from Felt Marshal Munich, with Advice, that one of the three Divisions of his Army, which is to be commanded by General Romanoff, had actually begun its March in order to go to Oczakow; but as General Romanoff had not yet joined that Division, it was commanded till his Arrival by General Adjutant Biron, the Duke of Courland's youngest Brother. The Czarina is informed by a Letter she received two or three Days ago from Don Duc Ombo, that he with his Calmucks having entred the Territory of the Cuban Tartars, about the latter End of April, had surpris'd a considerable Body of those Tartars, which he entirely routed, and had taken Prisoners above 2000 Families, with a great Number of Horses and Cattle, and that he was yet pursuing them towards the Mountains. General Keith continues so ill at Pultawa, that there is little Appearance at present that he will be able to make the Campaign.

Vienna, June 7, N. S. The Grand Duke is set out this Morning by Water for the Army, but Prince Charles, to avoid the Air of the River after his late Feverish Indisposition, goes by Land from Presbourg. There is Advice of Count Konigsegg's Arrival at Belgrade on the 27th past, N. S. We have no Accounts, as was expected, of Count Neuperger's having got together a Body considerable enough to cover the Bannat of Temeswar; on the contrary, the Dispositions and Preparations which had been made for rendezvousing the Army at Semlin, cannot, it is said, be so suddenly changed as is to be desired; and this Court, which had seemed to flatter itself for some Days past, that the Turks would not have been in a Condition to return to the Attack of Meadia, has received Advice Yesterday from Count Neuperger, that the Peasants from the neighbouring Mountains had seen the Imperial Garrison marching out of the Place.

Dresden, June 8, N. S. The King of Poland, who set out on the 27th past for Fraustadt, returned hither the 1st of this Month. During his Stay of two Days at

Fraustadt, his Majesty signed the Unive salia for the assembling of the general Diet of the States of Poland at Warlaw. His Majesty conferred on the Palatine of Culm, the Office of Treasurer of Poland; formerly the most lucrative one of the Crown, and still reckoned among the most considerable. His Majesty disposed likewise of a Starosta. The Palatinates and other vacant Offices will be reserved till his Majesty's Arrival at Warlaw. About two Hours after his Majesty left Fraustadt, Count Sapihea, General of the Artillery in Lithuania, was seized with an Apoplectick Fit, and died immediately. The two Saxon Envoys that were sent to Vienna to notify the late Marriage here, are returned. The Royal Family is now at Mauricebourg, where the Queen will lie in, and the King will chiefly reside till their Departure for Poland, which is now intended for the beginning of September, in order to be there some short Time before the opening of the Diet, which is to be on the 6th of October.

Kensington, June 11.

This Day being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Succession to the Crown, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment his Majesty on that happy Occasion. The Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired, and all publick Demonstrations of Joy were made.

It having been represented to His Majesty, That a most notorious and wicked Practice has of late Years prevailed, and does now particularly prevail, to a very high Degree, in His Majesty's Forest, called New Forest, in the County of Southampton, for Persons unknown, not only to cut down Trees, and Part of Trees, fit for the Service of His Majesty's Navy, but likewise to steal and take away from the said Forest, Timber, after it has been squared into proper Lengths for that Service; and it being apprehended, that the Persons guilty of the said Theft are chiefly encouraged thereto by Persons in the Neighbourhood, who receive the same from them: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Offenders, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement thereto, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds

Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover any Person or Persons, that have stolen, or may hereafter steal, any Timber from the said Forest, as aforesaid, or that have received, or may hereafter receive, any such Timber, knowing the same to be stolen, so that the said Offender or Offenders may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid by the Surveyor General of his Majesty's Woods for the Time being, on the Conviction of any of the said Offenders.

Whereas by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament for enforcing the Laws made for laying a Duty upon Retailers of Spirituous Liquors, and for Licencing the Retailers thereof, it is, amongst other Things enacted, That if any Persons, to the Number of Five or more, shall, after the Twenty fourth day of June, One thousand seven hundred and thirty eight, in a tumultuous and riotous Manner, assemble themselves to rescue any Offender against an Act made in the Ninth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for laying a Duty on Retailers of Spirituous Liquors, and for Licencing the Retailers thereof, or to assault, beat, or wound any Person or Persons, who shall have given, or be about to give, any Information or Evidence against, or shall have discovered or given Evidence against, or be about to discover or give Evidence against, seize or bring to Justice any Person or Persons offending against the said Act of the Ninth of His present Majesty, that then all and every Person or Persons, so assembling themselves, and their Aiders and Abettors, being thereof lawfully convicted, shall be guilty of Felony, and subject and liable to the like Pains and Penalties as in Cases of Felony, and may be transported for Seven Years. The Commissioners of Excise think it proper to give this publick Notice of the same, lest unwary Persons should incur the Penalties enacted by the said Law.
