**H**IS Majesty having granted a Commission to several Knights Companions of the most Noble Order of the Garter, empowering them, or any two or more of them, to install the Right Honourable the Earl of Essex in Person, and the Right Honourable the Earl Waldegrave by his Proctor Sir William Wyn, Knt. and to proceed therein and to perform all the Solemnities and Ceremonies required by the Statutes and Ordinances in such Cases,

Three of these Companions of the said Order named in the Commission, all of them robed in their compleat Habits, and with the Ensigns, met in the Great Chamber in the Dean's Lodgings, to which Place the Earl of Essex came in the Under Habits, carrying in his Hand his Cap with the Feathers and Hern Tops fixed thereto.

At this Place the most Noble the Dukes of Richmond and of Devonshire, Knights Companions of the Order, appeared in their full Habits; but their Graces not being in the Commission, were forthwith conducted to the Chapel, preceded by the poor Knights, Prebends of Windsor, Pursuivants, Heralds, and the Provincial Kings of Arms, all in their proper Habits, and their Graces with the usual Reverences, placed themselves in their respective Stalls.

The poor Knights and Prebends returning, attended in the Cloyster, and the said Officers of Arms in the Dean's Hall, till the Procession for the Installation began, which was in the following Manner to the Chapter House.

Poor Knights in their proper Mantles going by Pairs, being followed by the Prebends going two and two in Breast; then the Officers of Arms, according to their Degrees, in the like Manner; the Earl of Essex, in the Under Habits above-mentioned; then the Officers of the Order, the Register having on his Right Hand Garter King of Arms carrying the Sovereign's Commission, and on his Left the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, wearing their Crimson Mantles, and the Badges of their respective Offices; then the three Commissioners, the Junior in the Order going first.

The Earl of Wilmington Lord President.

Duke of Newcastle, with the Duke of Montagu on the Right Hand.

Having thus entred into the North Isle of the Chapel, the Alms Knights, Prebends, and Officers of Arms, made a Stand in their proper Distances beyond the Door of the Chapter House, and the Earl of Essex retired to a Chair placed for him in the Passage behind the Altar, and the Proctor for the Earl Waldegrave seated himself in ano-

ther Chair, while the Officers of the Order went into the Chapter House, where the three Knights Companions the Commissioners seated themselves at the Sides of the Table according to their Seniority and Form of the Stalls in the Chapel.

Then Garter with Reverence presented the Commission to his Grace the Duke of Montagu the Senior Companion and Commissioner, who gave it to the Register, who after Reading presented the same to the other Lords Commissioners, who re-delivered the same to the Register to be entred.

Garter was then commanded to conduct the Earl of Essex into the Chapter House, who was received by the Commissioners, and brought next the Place where the Ensigns of the Knight Elect were placed.

Garter was then commanded to conduct the Proctor of the Earl Waldegrave, who was received and placed in like Manner.

Then the Earl of Essex was invested with the Surcoat of the Order by the two senior Commissioners, the Register reading the Admonition; and then the belt and Sword was buckled on. The Knight Elect and Proctor remained in the Chapter House, while a Procession was made into the Chapel to offer the Hatchments of the Earls of Peterborow and Berkeley, the late deceased Knights, in the following Manner.

The poor Knights entred two and two, and being come into the Middle of the Choir, made their Reverences all together, first to the Altar, then towards the Sovereign's Stall, and proceeded up near to the Rails of the Altar, where they placed themselves on either Side of them.

The Prebends entred in the same Manner, and stood all of them below the poor Knights, excepting two, who were conducted to the Altar to receive the Hatchments to be offered.

The Officers of Arms in like Manner, and stood below the Prebends on both Sides.

The Officers of the Order in like Manner, and stood before their Seats.

Then the three Knights Commissioners,

The Earl of Wilmington,

Duke of Newcastle, with the Duke of Montagu on the Right Hand; the Junior entering first, and making his Reverences in the Middle of the Choir to the Altar, and then to the Sovereign's Stall, retired and stood in the Area under his Banner, which Ceremonies were repeated by the other two Commissioners jointly, they being Companions; and then the Banners, Swords and Helmets of the two deceased Knights were offered with the usual Ceremonies by these Companions.

The Banner of the late Earl of Peterborow by the Duke of Montagu on the Right Hand, and the Duke of Newcastle on the Left the late

late Earl's Sword by the Duke of Montagu on the Right Hand, and the Earl of Wilmington on the Left; his Helmet and Crest by the Duke of Newcastle on the Right, and the Earl of Wilmington on the Left.

The Achievements of the late Earl of Berkeley were offered in the same Manner.

Which being performed, the Commissioners retired under their respective Banners, and after due Reverences made, the Return to the Chapter House was in the Order specified above, and from thence a Procession was made into the Choir in the same Manner, Garter being in the Middle between the Register and the Black Rod, carried on a Velvet Crimson Cushion, edg'd and tassell'd with Gold, the Mantle, Hood, Great Collar, George thereto appendant, and the Book of Statutes, to the Desk of the Seat below the thirteenth Stall on the Sovereign's Side, assigned for the Earl of Essex; and the Knights entred into the Chapel with the accustomed Reverences,

The Earl of Wilmington,

The Duke of Montagu on the Right Hand, and the Duke of Newcastle, having between them the Earl of Essex, habited in his Surcoat, and carrying his Cap in his Hand.

The Junior Commissioner retired under his Banner, and the two Seniors conducted the Knight elect into the Seat where the Cushion with the Ensigns of the Order was placed, there the Knight Elect laying his Right Hand on the New Testament, took the Oath for the Observation of the Statutes.

Which being done, these two Commissioners conducted him into his Stall, where he was by them invested with the Mantle, Hood, Great Collar and George, whilst the Register read the accustomed Admonitions, and the Commissioners delivering to him the Book of Statutes, placed the Cap on his Head, and seated him in his Stall, who making his Reverences towards the Altar, and then to the Sovereign's Stall, the Commissioners embraced and congratulated him, and leaving him in his Stall, descended into the Area, and stood under their Banners with the accustomed Ceremonies.

Then the poor Knights, Prebends, and Officers of Arms, returned towards the Chapter House, and the Officers of the Order, and the Knights Commissioners entred into it, from whence the Proctor of the Earl Waldegrave was conducted in like Manner, Garter carrying on a Crimson Velvet Cushion the Mantle only.

The two senior Commissioners having conducted the Proctor to the Seat under the Stall of the Principal, where he was sworn to the Observation of the Statutes, carried him into the Stall, where they put the Mantle over his left Arm, so that the Cross embroidered with the Garter might be seen, and then they seated him in the Stall, who arising made his Reverences; and these Knights having embraced him, and congratulated him in the Name of his Principal, retired under their Banners, and the Proctor, during the remaining Part of the Ceremony, held the Mantle in the Form specified.

Then Garter went into the Middle of the Choir, and, after the usual Reverences, bowed to the two senior Commissioners, who

with like Ceremonies ascended their Stalls: The Junior Commissioner entred his Stall in like Manner.

During all this Time the Organ play'd; then Divine Service was begun, and the offertory Sentence being read, the poor Knights made their Reverences, and ranged themselves on both Sides, as near as they could to the Rails of the Altar: The Officers of Arms did the same, and Garter rising from his Seat, made his Reverences in the Middle of the Choir, and summoned the Earl of Essex and the Proctor, who descended together; who having made their Reverences in their Stalls, came down into the Choir; where meeting, they again made their Reverences together, and went to their Places under their Banners. Then all the other Knights being summoned, descended and retired in like Manner. All the Knights thus standing under their Banners, the two Provincial Kings of Arms repaired to their Graces the Dukes of Montagu and Newcastle, who made their Reverences first upon their moving from under their Banner, and again at the first Step of the Altar; and being come to the Rails of the Altar, made their Reverences to the Altar only, and kneeling down, offered Gold and Silver; and then rising up and making the like Reverences, went into their respective Stalls, and sat down. The like was performed by the Duke of Richmond alone, because his Companion was absent.

Then the Duke of Devonshire and Earl of Wilmington offered together; and last of all the Earl of Essex and the Proctor also offered together, and went into their respective Stalls.

The Knights being thus all returned to their Stalls, continued therein till Divine Service was ended, and were then summoned to descend into the Area, under their respective Banners; and a Procession was made out of the Choir down to the West Gate of the Chapel, and up through the South Isle, and out at the South Door, where the Proctor left the Mantle, and went no further in the Procession; and thence to the Lodgings, the Drums and Trumpets going before. In which Place first went the Poor Knights, then the Prebends, next the Officers at Arms, next the Officers of the Order, then the Earl of Essex alone.

The Earl of Wilmington, having on his Right Hand the Duke of Devonshire.

The Duke of Richmond alone.

The Duke of Newcastle, having on his Right Hand the Duke of Montagu.

The Knights had a splendid Dinner in the Guard Chamber; and when the second Course was bringing in, the Earl of Essex's Style was proclaim'd as is usual.
