London, June 27.

THIS Day the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council-Men of the City of London, waited on their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales at Norfolk-House in St. James's Square, and were introduced by his Grace the Duke of Queensbury, Lord of the Bed-Chamber in waiting to his Royal Highness; and they having prepared their Compliments on the Birth of the Prince, Mr. Baron Thomson the Recorder, delivered them as followeth.

May it please your Royal Highnesses,
WE the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council-Men of the City of London, most humbly beg Leave to attend your Royal Highnesses, to express our Joy on the Increase of your Royal Family by the Birth of a Prince, and upon the Recovery of her Royal Highness.

May your Royal Highnesses become the happy Parents of a numerous Offspring, to be a Delight to His Majesty and your Royal Highnesses, to give Joy to His Majesty's Subjects, and strengthen every Part of our Constitution.

We doubt not but by your Royal Highnesses Care, this young Prince will be early taught those virtuous Maxims, which alone can make a Prince and People happy; and that by the Example of His Majesty, and your Royal Highnesses, He will learn, That the Glory, as well as Security of the Throne, must be founded in the Hearts and Affections of the People.

To which His Royal Highness made this most gracious Answer.

My Lord, and Gentlemen,

I Return you my Thanks, and those of the Princess, for this new Instance of your Duty to the King, and of your Affection to Me. My Son, I hope, may come in Time to deserve the Gratitude of a free People, which His Majesty now enjoys; and it shall be my constant Care to instruct him, that true Loyalty can only be the Result of Liberty.

They all had the Honour to, kiss their Royal Highnesses Hands.

Vienna, June 18, N. S. The Chevalier Mandelli, one of the Emperor's Aides de Camp, is arrived here with an Account that Count Konigslegg actually passed the Danube at Kortzka with the Imperial Army

on the 9th Instant, in order to cover the Bantat of Temeswaer, and to drive, if possible, the Turks from their Posts at Meadia and Orlova; for which purpose the Detachment under Count Neuperg had already begun their march from Caransebes towards Meadia: By which Motions the Turks, who may have taken Possession of the Mountains and Passes on the East of Meadia, will not only, as it is supposed, be prevented from making farther Incursions into the lower Part of the Bantat, but if they do not retire in Time, will find themselves entirely surrounded.

Berlin, June 24, N. S. This Morning we had an Account from Potzdam, that his Prussian Majesty had fixed Saturday the 28th Instant for his Departure for Clevés.

Dresden, June 25, N. S. The Emperor having complied with most of the Conditions proposed by this Court for the continuing the Saxon Auxiliaries in his Imperial Majesty's Service, six Squadrons of Horse of 150 Men each, and five Battallions of Foot of 700 Men each, which with the Artillery will make about 5000 Men, are to remain in Upper Hungary till they are ready to march, which they will be in about five Weeks. The Regiments of Weissenfels and Sulkowski having suffered very little last Campaign, were to be immediately detached to join Count Konigslegg.

Whitehall, May 20, 1738.

It having been represented to His Majesty, That a most notorious and wicked Practice has of late Years prevailed, and does now particularly prevail, to a very high Degree, in His Majesty's Forest, called New Forest, in the County of Southampton, for Persons unknown, not only to cut down Trees, and Part of Trees, fit for the Service of His Majesty's Navy, but likewise to steal and take away from the said Forest, Timber, after it has been squared into proper Lengths for that Service; and it being apprehended, that the Persons guilty of the said Theft are chiefly encouraged thereto by Persons in the Neighbourhood, who receive the same from them: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Offenders, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement thereto, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover any Person or Persons, that have stolen, or may hereafter steal, any Timber from the said Forest, as aforesaid, or that have received, or may hereafter receive, any such Timber, knowing the same to be stolen, so that the said Offender or Offenders may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid by the

the Surveyor General of his Majesty's Woods for the Time being, on the Conviction of any of the said Offenders.
