THE following Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Devonshire; Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has by him been presented to His Majesty; Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects are always pleased with any Opportunity of congratulating your Majesty, but particularly on this joyful Event, the Birth of a Prince.

Every Addition to your Royal Family enlarges the Prospect of our Happiness. We hope to find the Virtues of your Majesty in your Royal Descendants.

The paternal Care your Majesty has always taken of your People, the perfect Enjoyment of our Religious and Civil Rights under your auspicious Reign, must always engage us ardently to wish for a long Continuance of that Royal Family, under which we find ourselves happy.

In Testimony whereof, we have caused the common Seal of the said City to be hereto affixed, this 16th Day of June, 1738.

Petersbourg, June 3. Last Wednesday Morning a Courier arrived here from Felt Marshal Munich, with Letters dated the 21st of May, by which the Czarina is informed, that Count Munich was then continuing his March, and had already advanced 50 Versts from Perevolotzna with the two last Divisions of his Army. The next Day a Courier arrived also from Don Duc Ombo, with the agreeable News, that he had again defeated with his Calmucks another Body of Cuban

Tartars, which he followed in the Mountains; and as he had been joined by a considerable Party of Cabardy Tartars, Don Duc Ombo was in Hopes to force all the Cuban to submit to the Czarina, 4000 Families having already submitted. Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Duke of Courland's Election, a great Number of the Russian Nobility, and all the Foreign Ministers, waited on his Highness in the Morning to make their Compliments on the Occasion.

Vienna, June 21, N. S. The Duke of Tuscany is arrived at Temeswaer, from whence he will proceed to join the Army forthwith. At the same Time that the Imperial Army is marching towards Meadia, Prince Lobkowitz is actually arrived with 10000 Men at the Porta Ferrea on the Frontiers of Transylvania, adjoining to the Mountains of Caranlebes and Meadia. By which Motion it is to be observed, that there is the greater Probability of surrounding the Turks in those Parts.

Berlin, June 28, N. S. The King of Prussia's Journey to Cleves, which was fixed for this Day, is put off till next Tuesday the 1st of July; when his Majesty will be accompanied by the Prince Royal, Prince William, the Prince of Dessau, the Prince of Holstein, General Buddenbrook, Colonel Dershaw, Adjutant General Hacke, Colonel Massau, and two Councillors of War, Schumaker and Eichel.

Dresden, June 29, N. S. The Recruits for the Auxiliary Saxon Troops in the Emperour's Service, set out from hence the 27th Instant. And on the same Day about Forty Sailors from Hambourg passed by here, for his Imperial Majesty's Service on the Danube.

And as a farther Encouragement thereto, His Majesty is pleased to promise, a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover any Person or Persons, that have stolen, or may hereafter steal, any Timber from the said Forest, as aforesaid, or that have received, or may hereafter receive, any such Timber, knowing the same to be stolen, so that the said Offender or Offenders may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid by the Surveyor General of his Majesty's Woods for the Time being, on the Conviction of any of the said Offenders.
