To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin.

May it pleafe your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects are always pleafed with any Opportunity of congratulating your Majefty, but particularly on this joyful Event, the Birth of a Prince.

Every Addition to your Royal Family enlarges the Prospect of our Happiness. We hope to find the Virtues of your Majefty in. your Royal Defcendants.

The Paternal Care your Majesty has always taken of your People, the perfect Enjoyment of our Religious and Civil Rights under your aufpicious Reign, must always engage us ardently to wifh for a long Continuance of that Royal Family, under which we find ourfelves happy.

In Teltimony whereof, we have cauled the common Seal of the faid City to be hereto affixed, this 16th Day of June, 1738.

Petersbourg, June 3. Last Wednesday Morning a Courier arrived here from Felt Marshal Munich, with Letters dated the 21st of May, by which the Czarina is informed, that Count Munich was then continuing his March, and had already advanced 50 Verfts from Perevolotzna with the two last Divi-fions of his Army. The next Day a Courier arrived alfo from Don Duc Ombo, with the agreeable News, that he had again defeated with his Calmucks another Body of Cuban

Tartars, which he followed in the Mountains; and as he had been joined by a confi-derable Party of Cabardy Tartars, Don Duc Ombo was in Hopes to force all the Cuban to fubmit to the Czarina, 4000 Families ha-ving already fubmitted. Yesterday being the Anniverfary of the Duke of Courland's Election, a great Number of the Ruffian Nobility, and all the Foreign Ministers, waited on his Highnels in the Morning to make their Compliments on the Occasion.

Vienna, June 21, N.S. The Duke of Tufcany is arrived at Temelwaer, from whence he will proceed to join the Army forthwith. At the fame Time that the Imperial Army is marching towards Meadia, Prince Lobkowitz is actually arrived with 10000 Men at the Porta Ferrea on the Frontiers of Tranfylvania, adjoining to the Mountains of Caranlebes and Meadia. By which Motion it is to be obfer-

ved, that there is the greater Probability of furrounding the Turks in those Parts. Berlin, June 28, N. S. The King of Pruffia's Journey to Cleves, which was fixed for this Day, is put off till next Tuefday the 1ft of July; when his Majeity will be accompanied by the Prince Royal, Prince William, the Prince of Deffau, the Prince of Holftein, General Buddenbrook, Colonel Derfhaw, Adjutant General Hacke, Colonel Maffau, and two Councillors of War, Schumaker and Eichel.
