Vienna, June 25.

Y Letters of the 18th Instant from Temeswaer we have Advice of Count Koniglegg's Arrival there, and that the Grand Duke and his Brother were expected the Day following; but Count Wallis, with the Army which had paffed the Danube, would not, it was thought, be up at Caransebes to join Count Neuperg's Detachment before the 21st or 22d, when the whole Army was to march on; and we expect to hear foon of fome important Events.

Berlin, July 1. N. S. On Sunday Morning last, as the Queen of Prussia was at Divine Service, three Expresses came one after another from Potsdam, requiring her Majesty to repair immediately thither; and about Three in the Afternoon M. Ellard, the King of Pruffia's First Physician, received the like Order, by another Express. Yesterday we heard that his Prufian Majefty's Indifpolition proved to be the Gout in his Hand, and that even the Pain was already very much dimi-nished. This Indisposition, how flight soever it be, not permitting his Pruffian Majefty to begin his Journey to Cleves to Day, as he did defign, the Carriages have been dismissed for a fecond Time, and order'd to be ready against Saturday next.

Berlin, July 5, N. S. His Prussian Ma-jestry's Journey is now fixed again for Tues-day next, the 8th Instant. All the Carriages and Post Horses are already ordered and laid, and in all Appearance his Pruffian Majesty will certainly fet out that Day. His first Defign was to go directly to Wezel, but now he will take the Rout by Brunfwick, where he will ftay two Days with the Duke his Son in Law. The principal Perfons of his Pruffian Majefty's Retinue are, the Prince Royal and Prince William his Sons, the Prince of Anlialt Deflau and Prince Maurice his Son, the Duke of Holftein, the Generals Boden-broke and Waldo, and feveral other Officers of Note; but they all go by Halberstadt, and are only to join his Pruffian Majefty at Minden.
