Petersbourg, June 17.

**B**Y Letters which the Czarina received some Days ago from her Minister at Ispahan, her Majesty is informed, that Shach Nadyr had at last taken the Town of Candahar, after a Siege of 18 Months; and that the Grand Mogul had consented to give him a large Sum of Money, in Consideration of an ancient Pretension of the Persians on the Moguls, for assisting them once with 30000 Men. It is also given out here, that the Bashaw of Babylon is on the Point of submitting to the Persians. The last Letters this Court has received from Felt Marshal Munich, are dated the 28th of May, which advise, that he continued his March, and was passing the River Ingul, which is about 250 Versts from Perevolotzna.

*Dresden, July 13, N. S.* Her Polish Majesty was delivered on the 11th Instant about Nine a-Clock in the Morning, of a Prince. He has been since christened by the Name of Albert. Count Colowart is dispatched to Spain, Major Bulow to Naples, Major Ricardi to Vienna, and Captain le Fort to Petersbourg, to notify this News. The two first have Letters to their Catholick and Sicilian Majesties, inviting the Catholick King, and the King of both Sicilies to be Godfathers, and the Queen of Spain to be Godmother. We have no News relating to Hungary, excepting that the Recruits and Supplies for the Saxon Auxiliary Troops are forced to halt on the Borders of Lusatia, the Route not being yet assigned for their March thro' Silesia.

*Hague, July 18, N. S.* The States of Holland are assembled, and have this Day disposed of all their Civil and Military Vacancies. The King of Prussia is supposed to be at this Time in the Country of Cleves, and very probably will appear here in a few Days. The Marquess de St. Gill is preparing a Feast for Wednesday next, to celebrate the Marriage of the King of Naples, having invited the chief People in Town to a Supper and Ball.

And as a farther Encouragement for the Discovery of such Offender or Offenders, Thomas Colebrooke does hereby promise to pay the Sum of Ten Pounds to any one of the said Offenders who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid.

Whitehall, May 20, 1738.

It having been represented to His Majesty, That a most notorious and wicked Practice has of late Years prevailed, and does now particularly prevail, to a very high Degree, in His Majesty's Forest, called New Forest, in the County of Southampton, for Persons unknown, not only to cut down Trees, and Part of Trees, fit for the Service of His Majesty's Navy, but likewise to steal and take away from the said Forest, Timber, after it has been squared into proper Lengths for that Service; and it being apprehended, that the Persons guilty of the said Theft are chiefly encouraged thereto by Persons in the Neighbourhood, who receive the same from them: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Offenders, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement thereto, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover any Person or Persons, that have stolen, or may hereafter steal, any Timber from the said Forest, as aforesaid, or that have received, or may hereafter receive, any such Timber, knowing the same to be stolen, so that the said Offender or Offenders may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid by the Surveyor General of his Majesty's Woods for the Time being, on the Conviction of any of the said Offenders.
