### Petersbourg, June 17.

Y Letters which the Czarina received fome Days ago from her Minister at Ispahan, her Majesty is informed, that Shach Nadyr had at last taken the Town of Candahar, after a Siege of 18 Months ; and that the Grand Mogul had confented to give him a large Sum of Money, in Confideration of an ancient Pretension of the Persians on the Moguls, for affifting them once with 30000 Men. It is also given out here, that the Bashaw of Babylon is on the Point of submitting to the Persians. The Point of fubmitting to the Perfians. And a, a farther Encouragement thereto, His Majelly is pleased to promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Ferson or Persons, who shall discover any Person or Persons, that have stolen, or may hereafter steal, any Timber from the faid Forest, as aforefaid, or that have received, or may hereafter receive, any juch Timber, knowing the fame to be folen, fo that the faid Offender or Offenders may be apprehended and convolted thereof; the faid Reward to be paid by the Surveyor General of his Majefty's Woods for the Time being, on the Conviction of any of the faid Of-fendurs.
