hord L. Dantzick , April z. From Warfaw our Letters tell us, That at length the differences between the King and those of the Faction, had been happily composed , that the chief Articles of this Accommodation were, That all pait offences thould be forgiven and forgotten; That the Confederation made the last year by the Nobility, fhould be canceld and made voide; And that all those, who have, during these unhappy millunderflandings, been noted by the name of Malecontents, should on all occasions partake of the Kings Favour without any diffinction, with the reft of the Nobility: To confirm which, the Grand General Sobietski came the last week to Warlaw ; attended with a very numerous Train ; upon his arrival he was complimented on the part of the King, by the Vice-Chancelor, and by the Weywode of Polen for the Senate, and in the name of the Nobility Affembled in the Diet, by two of their Deputies; We are told, that he hath proposed to the King and Senate, a War with the Turks, for the reas vering of what they fo fhamefully loft the laft Summer, which he feems confident to be able to effect, with an Army of 60000 Men, but as yet nothing hath been refolved in this matter, as being of greater moment then to admit of any fuddain refolution; The fame Letters add, That the Deputies of Lysbuania had made a Proposition, that every third Dyet should be kept at fome eminent place in that Dutchy, which the Nobility of Poland opposed, to that degree, that fome sharp words passed between them, which they of Lythuania stomaching, left the Assembly with a Protest against their proceedings, fo that at the coming away of those Letters, things were in great diforder.

Ditto, 8. By our last Letters from Warfaw of the 31 paft, and first instant, we have advice, that the Dyet was very busie about raising of Money, to carry on a War against the Turks, infomuch that they, were Affembled all the Holy week, that they might be able to dispatch their businels, before the Holidays of Easter; This is extraordinary, but the fafety of the Kingdom fufficiently requires it, they having been advertifed from feveral parts, that the Turks proparations against them are very great; above so thousand Turks are already come to Caminiec, and the Jarrars are ordered to be in readinels to make an incursion into Poland, and to give quarter to none that are above feven years of age: Letters are now come from Warfam, which tell us, that the Dyet could not come to a conclusion before the Holidays, and had therefore Adjourned their Sellion till the fifth. That they were agreed with the Deputies of Lishuania, that every third general Dyet should be held at Gredna in thas Dutchy; in lieu of which, the latter had promifed to raife 12000 Men, with a fuitable Train of Artillery, to joyn with the Forces of the Crown against the Common Enemy; what Forces they will raile, or what Fond to maintain them, is not yet determined; it is thought it may be by way of Poll, viq: a Gilder for each Head, and befides that, every to Hooues of Land, which is about 300 Acres, fhould find a Horfeman, and to thousand Gilders in perfonal Effate a foot man; in few days we expect the certainty.

Hambrough, April 11. The Imperial Troops under the Command of the Duke de Bournonville, are at prefent refreining themfelves in their quarters in Franconia, G.c. The Elector of Brandenburgh is arrived at Berlin, having left 3000 Horfe in the Stift of Minden, who have hitherto fecured that Countrey againft the Munfter and Cologne Troops. The Swedes are bringing a great Force together; and the Elector of Brandenburgh as is faid raifes Men in Pomeren. The States of Lower Saxony are within few days to meet; at Brunfwick, to confult for the defence of the Country, during the prefent Conjuncture, and to refolve on the Masfures they are at prefent to take; The Mun fier and Cologne Troops have taken feveral places in the Diocefe of Hille fleim, which were poffelfed by the Brankdenburghs, and are Paffages on the River Lein.

Cologne, April 14, We have had here for fome days palt a general difcourfe of the Treaty concluded between the most Christian King and the Elector of Brandenburgh, in purfuance whereof the faid Elector has, as we 2 Fold, already arawn his Tritops out of the Terri-tories of the Elector of Colegne and Bithop of Mun-fter, Allies of France, and Monficur de Turenne is going to quit the County of Mark; feveral French Regiments have already begun their march, and are to lodge on the Reer, and the Frontiers of Bergb, with intentions, as is faid, to pass the Rhy ne at We (cl, where Monfieur de Turenne, they fay, is likewife very fuddainly expected ; ar prefent he lies in his old Quarter at soeft, having forbid the French Troops that lie in that place and in Ham, to go out of the Gates on pain of death, to secure the Countrey People thereabouts from all di-Rurbance they might otherwise receive by the Soldierya We have advice that Count Conning mark was come with 1500 Horfe into the County of Waldeck with defign of paffing into Wetteravia. Our Letters from Munster of the II tell us, that the Steur Ket, Author of the late conspiracy for putting that place, as well as the Person of the Bishop into the hands of the Enemy, had been executed there, and that there were feveral others who were in a day or two to receive the fame punishment, General Nagell, who Commands the Bishops Troops, had, according to our advices of the II from Lipfedt, invelted Bilevelt fome days before:

Liege, April 14. The French Troops that lay in Westphalia, begin to moye again towards Berg sland, and it is faid, that Monsieur de Tayenne is expected at Mulbeim; We cannot yet hear with certainty, whether Cologne or Aix la Chapelle is the place appointed for the Treaty, most still think it will be the former, the Magistrates there having agreed, that though they cannot leave themicilves without a Garrison, yet that to gratitie the Princes who are to fend their Ambassadors thither, they will appoint fome other perfon, which may not be subject, to Command, during the faid Treaty. We have

news hare of a discovery of an intended attempt upon Namur by the French, and that feveral perfons have been Arrented upon this account, but the particulars we yet want, which had many coplar queltion the trends of this report, by chereiay the Prince of Corde arrived a Tongres from Churleroy, having with him 5 or 500 Horse, this day he is gone for Maleych, and intends for Utrecht.

The French bring regener a great Forcein Flanders, which troubles us the more, scaule we fee no preparations made any where which may be able to oppose them.

"Urrecht, April 15. Our Bilhop who weit lately to the French Court, to pray of his Majefty an abate-ment of the Taxes wo now pay, is returned again hither, but what fuccess his journey hath had, we do not yet hear. Preparations are making here for the reception of the Prince of Conde, who we suppose to be by this time arrived at Wefel on his way hither. We continue to work out new Citradel here, which when finished, will be of great facurity to this place. It is faid that the Prince of Gonde will Commund a confiderable Army in these parts, That Monsie de Turenne with an other, will guard the R γn , and that the King will Command in Perfor the Main Army, which it is thought, will rendezvous the latter end of this Month in *Flanders*, However we talk in the mean time, much of Peace.

Amsterdam, April 15. Our Men are working at Newerbrug to make up the Dike again, which they hope to effect in s thort time. The Sieur Berleey, Relident for this Stare in Portugal, being larely dead, the States have appointed his Son to fucceed him. We have difpatched hence the necessary Passports for the Earl of Sunderlands Sir Lionel Fenkins, and Sir Fojepb Williamfon, whom His Majefty of Great Brittain hath appointed His Extraordinary Ambassand Plenipotentiaries for the

Freaty of Peace. 1 Paris, April 19. The preparations that are made here for War, are very extraordinary ; about the beginning of the next month the King begins the Campagne; Our Plenipotentiaries are preparing for their Journey, and intend, as is faid, to fet forward on it this day fortnight. The Prince of Conde we hear, is passed by Maestricht on his way for Htrecht, in which Province he will have a very confiderable Army very fuddenly under his Command. We have advice of a Treaty concluded between this Crown and the Elector of Brandenburgh ; and that Monfieur de Turenne is marching towards Friesland. ł ' 1
