

Persons of Distinction with a Supper and Ball, on Occasion of the Marriage of the King of the Two Sicilies with the Princess of Poland.

Whitehall, July 21, 1738.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that in the Month of March last, a Dutch Ship, called the Anna and Helena, was stranded in Bigbury Bay in the County of Cornwall, laden with Wine, Brandy, and other Goods, the greatest Part of which Cargo was plundered and carried off by great Numbers of Persons, who assembled in a riotous and tumultuous Manner to His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery and Plunder, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any Four of the Offenders, who shall first discover Three or more of their Accomplices, so that they be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

It having been represented to His Majesty, That a most notorious and wicked Practice has of late Years prevailed, and does now particularly prevail, to a very high Degree, in His Majesty's Forest, called New Forest, in the County of Southampton, for Persons unknown, not only to cut down Trees, and Part of Trees, fit for the Service of His Majesty's Navy, but likewise to steal and take away from the said Forest, Timber, after it has been squared into proper Lengths for that Service; and it being apprehended, that the Persons guilty of the said Theft are chiefly encouraged thereto by Persons in the Neighbourhood, who receive the same from them to His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Offenders, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement thereto, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover any Person or Persons, that have stolen, or may hereafter steal, any Timber from the said Forest, as aforesaid, or that have received, or may hereafter receive, any such Timber, knowing the same to be stolen, so that the said Offender or Offenders may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid by the Surveyor General of his Majesty's Woods for the Time being, on the Conviction of any of the said Offenders.
