HE King of Prussia is expected at Loo this Day, with the Prince Royal his Son. The Prince of Orange l-as been at Wesel to attend his Majesty and invite him to Loo, and they went together from thence to dine at a Place called Moock, not far from Nimuegen, whither the King of Prussia went to be present at the Parade of that Garrison. The Prince Royal of Prussia is expected to come to Holland. The States of Holland leparated Yes-We have Letters from Vienna of the 19th of July, which fay it was rumour'd there, that on the 11th a Detachment of Grenadiers and of Infantry, of the Army commanded by the Great Duke of Tuscany, inarched to Toplitz; that the main Army remained that Day in its Camp between that Place and Meadia; that all the Infantry followed the said Detachment the 12th, in order to march the 13th to Orsova; but as on the 13th every thing was ready for the Departure of the Grenadiers from Toplitz for Orsova, who were to have been followed the same Day by all the Infantry, there came Advice, that the Turks who had abandoned their Camp at Orfova, and had retired down the Danube, had received at Cladova, two Leagues below Orlova, a ftrong Reinforcement from the Grand Vizier, and being actually returned back to their old Camp, had, in several Skirmishes, beat out of it such of the Imperialists, as Husfars and others, as had been in Possession of it for three Days: and that the Grand Vizier himself was expected with his main Army at Cladova. But of these Particulars we wait for an authentick and confirmed Account.

It having been represented to His Majesty, That a most notorious and wicked Practice has of late Years prevailed, and does now particularly prevail, to a very high Degree, in His Majesty's Forest, called New Forest, in the County of Southampton, for Persons unknown, not only to cut down Trees, and Part of Trees, fit for the Service of His Majesty's Navy, but likewise to steal and take away from the said Forest, Timber, after it has been squared into proper Lengths for that Service; and it being apprehended, that the Persons guilty of the said Theft are chiefly encouraged thereto by Persons in the Neighbourhood, who receive the same from them: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Offenders, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement thereto, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover any Person or Persons, that have stolen, or may bereafter steal, any Timber from the said Forest, as afore-said, or that have received, or may bereaster receive, any such Timber, knowing the same to be stolen, so that the said Offender or Offenders may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid by the Surveyor General of his Majesty's Woods for the Time being, on the Conviction of any of the said Of-HOLLES NEWCASTLE.
